## CAST OREGON'S BALLOT MONDAY

### Hugh McLain Has Chances of Becoming Messenger to Washington.

SALEM, Jan. 11.—In ceremonious manner, the five Democratic presidential electors will assemble in Salem next Monday at noon and cast Oregon's electoral vote for Woodrow Wilson. Then one of the five will be selected as messenger to carry the glad tidings to Washington and cast Oregon's five votes in the electoral college. This is according to the federal law. The state law provides that this canvass of votes shall be made in December so there is a clash between the federal and state laws.

Hugh McLain, to be on the safe side, went to Salem in December to cast the vote, so far as he was concerned, and comply with the state law, but he was the only one of the five Democratic Electors on the job. Next Monday the quintet will be on hand and proceed under the federal statute. Formerly the electors went according to the state law, but the last two groups of Republican electors submitted to the federal regulation.

There is keen anxiety on the part of each of the five Democrats to be selected as messenger. H. M. Watson thinks he should be selected because he received the highest number of votes, but the four others do not consider that this is any qualification for Watson. Lives in Portland and naturally would receive the largest vote. Another elector argues that it would give him an opportunity to visit his old home in the East and he has not seen his native town in 12 years. Coos Bay people want to see McLain selected, because if he goes to Washington he can urge the need of governmental aid for the harbor.

#### COLD IN CURRY COUNTY.

Last Saturday and Sunday nights registered the coldest in these parts since 1887-8. The thermometer stood each morning at 25 above, and at Agnes it registered 18 above. Ice formed each night to a very unusual thickness, about 5-6 of an inch thick the first night. The south wind is now coming and the frost is disappearing.—Gold Beach Globe.

#### NEW CURRY COUNTY TRAIL.

Jacob Fry, the Mule Creek road supervisor, was in attendance at county court. He informs us that he secured \$200 from the Forestry Service and with its help was able to make a three-foot trail around that long strip of bedrock just below Solitude, and also around Tishnor's Defeat, in the exception of a few days' work at the latter place.—Gold Beach Globe.

#### CURRY COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL.

#### HAD "SOME" NUGGETS.

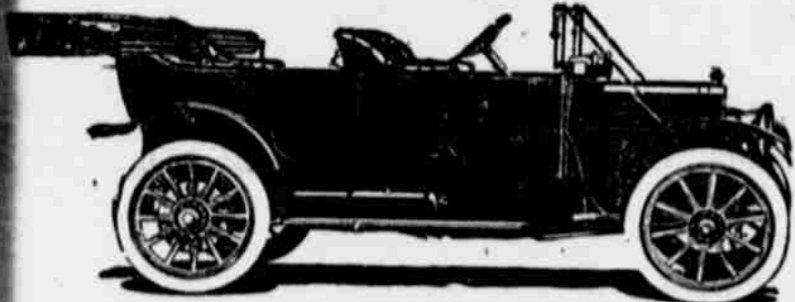
