WHAT COLORS MEAN.

Each Familiar Shade Once Had an Occult Significance.

In the lore of the medieval mystics each color had a meaning of its own.

Black has always stood for hatred, malice—all the evil influences of the world. Red has many meanings. Deep red upon a background signifies anger; blood red, brutality; dull rust color, avarice, and a brownish red, selfish love.

As brownish red means selfish love, brown alone stands for selfishness, while a greenish brown is jealousy. Livid gray is fear and dull gray depression.

Crimson is the sign and symbol of love, and when the crimson is changed to a beautiful rose color it represents unselfish love, while the same rose color tinged with lilac means spiritual love for humanity.

Orange is the color of love and ambition, and yellow is intellectuality. Green of a slimy, ugly shade stands for deceit and cunning, but emerald green is versatility, and a luminous blue green means deepest sympathy and compassion. Apple green stands for strength and vitality.

A luminous lilac blue means an exceedingly high spirituality and when used or worn with gold means elevated spiritual aspirations, such as the martyrs and saints lived and died for.
