## AUTO LINE TO MAKE CHANGES

### Corst & King Enlarge Cars and Plan Reduction in North Bend Fares.

Corst & King are making plans for a number of improvements in their Marshfield-North Bend auto line. The company's Lozier car is now in the shops having an extension put on to it so that it will carry ten passengers. The enlarged car will soon be ready for service and two of the other cars will later be equipped similarly.

They now have orders in for some very large passenger cars, ones that will carry twenty or thirty passengers, each, and expect to be able to get them by the middle of the summer. When these are received, they will make a round trip rate of about twenty-five cents between the two towns.

After January 20, they will make a new schedule of rates effective until the future reduction. The new schedule will be twenty cents one way and thirty-five cents for the round trip. They will also issue twenty-ride books for \$3.00.

They are now issuing a working man's ticket of twenty-six rides for \$6.50.
