TO OPEN TWO MORE CAMPS

Copenhagen Bros. Plan to Increase Their Force Near Gardiner to Over 300.

Chas. H. Marsh, right of way agent for the Southern Pacific, who has just returned from a trip to Gardiner, reports that the Copenhagen Bros. are planning to put in two more construction camps along Schofield Creek, between the tunnel and the Umpqua. They are now working about 115 men in one camp and when they get the three camps going, they will have probably upwards of 300 men at work. The bad weather has been a serious handicap to them but they are trying to keep the crews all busy. The steam shovel has made one cut through to the tunnel.

Mr. Marsh says that Porter Bros. expect to have right of way clearing camps started north of the Umpqua soon. Johnson Porter was in Gardiner last week and is supposed to have made preliminary arrangements for this so that the actual grading and construction there can start as soon as the weather will permit.

HUGH M'LAIN GIVEN HONOR

Marshfield Man Chosen Presidential Messenger from Oregon to Capital.

Hugh McLain of Marshfield, one of the Oregon National Electors, was yesterday honored by being selected the state's official messenger to Washington. At the meeting of the electors at Salem to cast the state's ballot for President-elect Wilson, Mr. McLain was chosen by the other delegates to represent them at Washington.

The glad news was conveyed in a telegram which Mrs. McLain received from Mr. McLain today. He will return Thursday from his trip north and after spending a few weeks here on business will depart for Washington.

In addition to the honor in the selection, Mr. McLain and Coos Bay will benefit otherwise. While at Washington Mr. McLain will be able to do a little missionary work for the Coos Bay harbor and harbor improvements, which will be decidedly beneficial following the work of the special Coos Bay delegation now there.

In addition to this, Mr. McLain will also be able to get in touch with the leaders there and aid his candidacy for United States marshal for Oregon. It may possibly be, though, that his selection as presidential messenger from Oregon will be taken as sufficient honor for him and some of the other candidates for U. S. marshal may try to use it to forward their own candidacies.
