WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—Dr. J. T. McCormac, a member of the Coos Bay delegation here endeavoring to secure federal aid for the immediate reconstruction of the Coos Bay Jetty, has gone to New York to visit his old friend, W. T. Hornaday. Mr. Hornaday is director of the Bronx Zoological garden, having charge of the greatest collection of wild animals and birds in captivity. Dr. Hornaday is recognized as the greatest naturalist of the time. He and Dr. McCormac were classmates at the Iowa Agricultural College at Ames, Iowa in 1873.
