have been a handsome thing for them to do in view of the fact that suffrage has just carried and a woman would be eligible. Mrs. Oswald West, wife of the governor, would probably have been chosen, had the electors thought of the idea sooner.

### Making Fine Record.

"The Coos county members of the Oregon Legislature are making a fine start and I think Coos and Curry counties will be better represented this year than they have ever been," said Mr. McLain. "Senator Smith is taking a hold right and is a prominent figure in the senate. He has secured some good committee appointments and is doing the work. The joint memorial to congress in behalf of the Coos Bay jetty was a good move and he will make a good record."

Representatives Barton and Peirce are also doing well. They have got some good seats in the house, more prominent than the Coos county men had before. Mr. Peirce is slated for membership on the ways and means committee and some other good appointments. He wanted to be chairman of the powerful ways and means committee, but Speaker McArthur thought this was a little too much, but he promised to give him some good places. Barton will also do well.
