Killed on Engine—A couple of weeks ago the Times contained an announcement of the death of H. M. Farren, one of the promoters of an electric line from Roseburg to Coos Bay. Farren was never on the Bay, but was at Roseburg and was in communication with E. L. C. Farrin and J. M. Upton and others here about a bonus for the road. His project went to pieces and last fall he resumed work as a fireman on the Milwaukee near Seattle.
