Hearing Tomorrow.—A hearing of the creditors of Mr. Ames, the Myrtle Point logger, who recently went into bankruptcy, will be held in Judge Schibred's office tomorrow, having been postponed.

Wed at Salem.—The Falls City News of Falls City, Oregon, contains the following item which will be of interest on the Bay: "Leo Tibbitts and Miss Allie Covel were married at Salem Thursday."

To Build Houses.—S. T. Mellish, formerly of Olympia, Wash., is here with a view of locating. He has been engaged in building and selling houses, and thinks Coos Bay would be a good place to locate. He says that the Oregon and Washington laws make it difficult to build and sell under contract.

Wed in East.—Billy Watson, who has just returned from a couple of months on the Claude Noble ranch at Ten Mile, says he received a card from Jimmy Green, formerly employed on Ferguson's transfer line, saying that Green had recently been married at Brooklyn, N. Y. Green stated that he and his bride would come to Coos Bay next May.

Miss Tower Better.—The Eureka Herald of last Wednesday says, "According to reports from the hospital, Miss Gwynedde Tower, who lost an arm and leg Sunday afternoon by being run over by an E street car, was this afternoon greatly improved in strength and practically no doubt existed as to the outcome of her injuries. Aside from a remote danger of infection her condition is such that final recovery is certain."

Name Receiver.—J. L. Kronenberg of Bandon was appointed receiver for the bankrupt Miocene Oil and Gas Company of Bandon. His bond was fixed at \$3,000. M. D. Sherrard, J. Ira Sidwell and Steve Gallier were appointed appraisers. Eight or nine bills have been filed, aggregating about \$2500. It is possible that the receiver may take action to recover from some of the stockholders, who have not paid up in full, according to Judge Schibred, referee in bankruptcy.

Court Next Week.—Judge J. S. Coke will convene an adjourned term of circuit court at Coquille next Monday, January 27. A number of damage suits are slated for trial. Among them is the Parker case vs. the Smith Lumber Co. and the City of Marshfield, Geo. S. Randall vs. the Smith Co., and John West vs. the Smith Co., the latter on a motion to have it remanded from the federal court to the circuit court and the case of Svensen vs. the Cody Lumber Co. If they come to trial, as is now expected, they will be tried before juries with the exception of the hearing on the West case.

No Action Taken.—No action has been taken yet concerning the prosecution of the parties who failed to stop the fight in the Blanco hotel Saturday night between Magee and Morales, the latter being a Mexican instead of a Greek as was first reported. Just what will be done is not known. Through a typographical error in the Times yesterday, it was stated that Mayor Straw was not in favor of such a prosecution. Mayor Straw took the first stand that whenever there was trouble of any kind around that the owners of the places should call an officer at once instead of allowing the brawl to go ahead, or the parties simply thrown into the street, and he had notice to this effect served on the saloons a few months ago.

HUGH M'LAIN RUSHES EAST

Oregon Democratic Messenger Finds That He Is Due in Capital Next Monday.

Hugh McLain yesterday discovered that instead of reaching Washington, D. C., with the Oregon electoral vote by February 12 that he had to be there with the returns next Monday. If he doesn't he found that a fine of \$1000 or so was attached to the delay and so he made arrangements to get away last night by Gardiner and Drain, special rigs being hired to get him through as rapidly as possible. He plans to make a flying connection at Portland for a through train east and hopes to get into Washington next Monday night. The discovery of the requirement was made accidentally, Mrs. McLain having noticed an item in one of the papers that Rhode Island had already sent in its returns. This started Hugh to thinking, on account of the mixup in the Oregon laws about the original meeting of the electors, and upon looking up the law he found that next Monday was the last day for the electors to bring the votes to Washington, although official action is not taken on the returns until February 12. Owing to the blockades of trains in the mountains and near Portland by the recent blizzard, it is doubtful if he can make it through by that time, but such a contingency would probably be taken into account by the government.
