**Port Bonds**—A special meeting of the Port of Coos Bay will probably be held tonight to pass on a new question in the \$300,000 bond issue. Allen Frake, who bought them for the C. W. McNear Company, has just been advised by his house that their attorneys have decided against the deferred payment of the bonds owing to recent litigation in a case in California. It is expected that the matter will be adjusted all right, but it may delay the receipt of the first payment of \$150,000, which the Port Commission had hoped to get about March 1, to start work in the harbor improvements.
