One Man Killed for Every 144,000 Former Master of Alliance Given Tons of Coal Mined.

WASHINGTON, Jan. miner's life is snuffed out with every 183,000 tons of coal mined in the United States. In 1907 when the federal bureau of mines was beginning its work the ratio was greater. One life was given with every 144,-000 tons. Dr. Joseph A. Holmes, di-rector of the United States Bureau of Mines, in his annual report to Secretary Fisher attributes the decrease in the mortality to the federal government's work in the mining fields, and points out how the enor-mous death list may be still further

While much remains to be done, including a broad extension of the investigation of accident and rescue work so that it will include metal and other mineral mines as well as coal mines. Dr. Holmes shows that whereas there was an average of 6.93 men kiled for every 1,000,000 tons of coal mined in 1907, this number decreased steadily to 6.05 in 1908. to 5.79 the next year, 5.66 in 1910 and 5.48 in the calendar year 1911. SALEM, Ore., Jan. 23.—A bill to prohibit the promiscuous sale of reis being prepared by Senator Perkins. The bill will provide that dealers in firearms must obtain a license for the sale of revolvers. and that one who wishes to buy that variety of firearm will first have to obtain a permit from the sheriff of the county in which he wants make the purchase. He must satisfy the official that he wishes the revolver for a peaceful purpose, and if that officer is satisfied that the ap-plicant is a fit person to carry the weapon he will issue a permit on the payment of a nominal fee.
