KEEP THE PUBLIC  
IN GOOD HEALTH.

THE conservation of health has become a world-wide movement.

Science, philanthropy, government and business have become allies of medicine in this crusade against disease.

The association of the presidents of American insurance companies asks:

"What can we best do and how best do it?"

In their judgment the endeavor to obtain complete and trustworthy vital statistics for the entire country affords the best answer to their inquiry.

The scientific knowledge that medicine and hygiene have acquired for the prevention or cure of several forms of disease can not be employed to advantage without trustworthy vital statistics. The public health of communities can not be intelligently treated until medical science acquires full and accurate information as to physical and hygienic conditions there.

The American Medical association, however, declares that "we have no general and thorough system for recording the chief events of life, especially births and deaths. The condition of the registration of vital statistics, considering the country as a whole, is not far from constituting a national disgrace."

In national statistics there is nothing more important than vital statistics. They bear directly on the welfare of the nation. A community without vital statistics, without means, that is, of knowing with what contagious diseases it is afflicted, is helpless to protect itself. Trustworthy vital statistics inform intelligent and energetic health officers about the habits and habits of disease and help them to enforce laws for the protection of public health. Defective vital statistics and low standards of health go hand in hand. Public health in a sense is built on and directed by statistics.

The work that this association of insurance officials has resolved to take upon itself may seem remote from public welfare, but in reality it is fundamental to the health of communities.

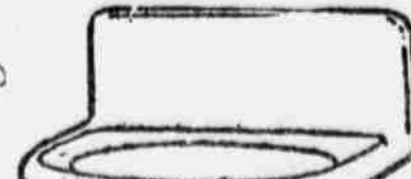
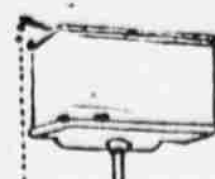
