GAME RULING SENT DOWN

Possession Out of Season Illegal Regardless When Killed.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 29.—The decision of the Supreme Court Tuesday in the case of the State vs. Pulos is taken by Game Warden Finley as clearly establishing the principle that the mere possession of game out of season is illegal, even if it be shown that the game had been killed in the open season.

In speaking of this ruling, Mr. Finley expressed the opinion that this would result in a general tightening of the game department's regulations as regards the storing of game in closed season. This is a question that has been considerably in doubt since the ruling in the case of the State vs. Fisher, which was taken as virtually establishing the principle that game could be held over without making the owner liable. Both decisions were by Chief Justice McBride.

LANE FINALLY ELECTED.

Legislature Ratifies Senatorial Selection.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28.—The last scene in the process of making a United States Senator from Oregon was enacted in the hall of the House of Representatives at noon Wednesday, when Dr. Harry Lane, of Multnomah County, was declared duly elected to the highest office within the gift of the people of the state.

All the ceremony incident to the time when the election of a United States Senator was a peculiar function of the Legislative Assembly was brought into play. With Dan J. Malarkey, president of the Senate, presiding, the journals of both houses of the day before relating to the vote of the senatorship were read.

"It is my pleasant duty to announce," said President Malarkey, when the journals had been read, "that the Legislature has ratified the choice of the people, and that Dr. Harry Lane is duly elected United States Senator from Oregon."

STOP SIUSLAW FISHING.

Plan to Close River to Commercial Industry for Five Years.

FLORENCE, Ore., Jan. 29.—Petitions which are being circulated asking that the Siuslaw River be closed to commercial fishing for a term of five years are receiving very small support in this section and the lower Siuslaw Valley.

The size of the salmon pack of recent years indicates a steady increase. For the years 1887 to 1899 inclusive the total pack of salmon on the Siuslaw approximated 121,389 cases, while for the years of 1900 and 1912 inclusive the pack totalled 122,668. These figures do not include the fish salted or the large numbers taken out by the fish wagons and otherwise hauled out over the stage road during the past seven or eight years.

The 1911 pack was 13,455 cases and the 1912 pack was 13,240 cases. Boats on the upper river did not make as large catches this year as in some seasons, owing to the increased number of boats in the lower river.

OLD CASES DROPPED.

Indictments Against Roschurg Men Are Dismissed.

PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—In the federal court here Judge Bean dismissed the indictments filed in 1905 against Frank E. Alley of Roschurg and Stephen W. Turnell, A. R. Downs and Edward Downs, former residents of that city, charged with conspiracy to defraud the government out of lands in the Roschurg district. The indictments were returned while Francis J. Heney was acting as special federal attorney.

COW WEALTH PRODUCER.

P. W. Laird of Coquille Receives \$145 for Year's Product.

The Coquille Herald says: P. W. Laird, a dairyman near the city, realized \$145 for butter produced from one of his cows last year. The milk and benefit derived by way of fertilizing the ranch would pay the board bill of the cow, leaving the snug sum above as profit, to which also can be added a valuable offspring. Mr. Laird has a system of keeping record of the product of each individual cow in his excellent herd of high grade Jerseys, none of which has fallen below \$80 in butter for any one year and most of them earning for their owner over \$100.
