New Company—It is announced that Warren Reed and Frank Varrelman are among those who have formed a stock company to put in an electric plant at Gardiner. Part of the equipment has arrived and is being installed by L. A. Donovan.

Leave Tomorrow—Miss Juliette Chandler, Maybelle Lee, Mr. Lee and Martin Sharrard will be passengers on the outgoing Drain stage tomorrow morning. Lee & Chandler have finished playing the Coquille valley and it is reported that Martin Sharrard has joined the Chandler-Lee company.

Coos Bay Wins—In the inter-collegiate oratorical contest at Willamette University, Salem, last Tuesday, Eric P. Bolt of this city won first place. The title of his oration was "National Vitality," and is said to be a fine production. One of the judges was Judge Eakin of the Oregon supreme court.

New Phone Service—A joint meeting of the Farmer's Telephone Companies of Haynes and Larsen Inlet will be held today for the purpose of discussing the advisability of putting in a joint cable connecting direct with North Bend. This will give double communication with North Bend, whereas there has been but one.

Smith Replies—Henry Sengstacken is in receipt of a letter from Senator J. S. Smith expressing his appreciation of a note of congratulations from Mr. Sengstacken to Mr. Smith for securing the memorial from the Oregon legislature asking congress to make an appropriation for Coos Bay.

Launching Tomorrow—Mrs. Claud Piper and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Piper and Mrs. James Nowlin and daughter, Jeanette, all of North Coos River were in Marshfield this morning on their way to North Bend to attend the launching of the new steam schooner, San Ramon, tomorrow morning. Jeanette Nowlin will christen the new vessel.

Mine Closed—Development work on the Millicoma Coal Mine, owned by J. A. Ward, has been stopped. Mr. Ward leased the property to Portland parties last fall, who started the work, but some dissensions arose which resulted in the work stopping a short time ago. Whether they will drop the lease or resume development is uncertain.

Brother Dead—Relatives of the late Peter Blake today recalled that Mr. Blake's only brother died at Toronto, Canada, a number of years ago, Peter Blake having been at his bedside. Some had thought that the brother was still living, but this is a mistake. The only living relatives are nieces and nephews and more distant relatives.

Buy Coquille Paper—It is announced that Lew A. Cates, formerly editor of the Cottage Grove Sentinel, has purchased the Coquille Valley Sentinel from J. C. Savage and will take possession in a week or so. Mr. Cates formerly held important positions with the Milwaukee papers and for a time was connected with the St. Paul Pioneer Press.

Get Big Contract—Word has been received from San Francisco that Sudden & Christenson, who own the Prosper sawmill, which is managed by Archie Kruse, formerly of Marshfield, have secured the contract for \$100,000 worth of lumber for the educational building at the San Francisco exposition. The firm operates its own vessels and it is expected that much of the lumber will be supplied from Coos county mills.

Travelling Man Dies—News was received today by Dan Keating of the sudden death in Portland, Thursday morning, of J. Hulgston Smith, a travelling man well known on Coos Bay. Mr. Smith formerly represented the Gorham Revere Rubber Co. in this section and was also with the Nott Fire Engine Co., having sold the City of Marshfield its present apparatus. Many Marshfield friends will learn of his death with genuine regret.

Just Missed Out—John Herron, in discussing Bud Anderson's recent victory at Vernon, California, and the practical certainty of Anderson gaining the world's championship, stated that he almost secured Anderson's management a year or so ago. 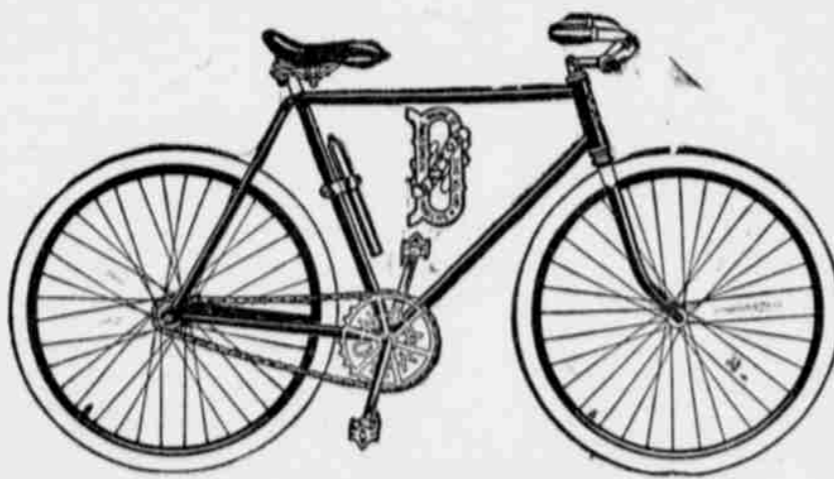
