SAYS COOS BAY LAND IS HELD TOO HIGH

J. W. Kays of Eugene Says Marshfield People Are Boosters.

The Eugene Guard says: J. W. Kays, retired furniture dealer of this city, returned last night from a two weeks' trip to Marshfield and other coast points. He went to Coos Bay for the purpose of looking around with a view to investing in acreage around Marshfield, but found that the prices of land were sky high and came away without spending any of his money. He says that land two miles out of Marshfield is held at \$1000 an acre and that around the city 100,000 or more town lots have been laid out, some of them two or three miles out. He says the people down there are confident that another Seattle or San Francisco will be built on the bay and declares that they are the greatest boosters and the most optimistic he has ever seen. He was shown every courtesy while in Marshfield and says there are a lot of fine people down there but they want too much money for their land. He thinks himself that there will be a great city on the bay some day and that the new S. P. railroad is going to help the country out wonderfully.

FINE TRIBUTE PAID MEMORY

Large Attendance at Memorial Exercises for George McCutcheon.

The Masonic Opera House yesterday afternoon was practically crowded with the audience that turned out to pay a final tribute to the memory of George McCutcheon, a former member of the band and one of the most popular young men in Marshfield, who died recently in California. It was one of the largest audiences that ever turned out on a similar occasion here.

The Rev. R. E. Browning delivered the innovation and the eulogy. His theme was "Good Fellowship," the manner in which George McCutcheon was regarded. He spoke of the higher attributes of "Good Fellowship," the kind that does good and in addition to winning friends makes the friends and the world better for the exercising of it. He pointed out Mr. McCutcheon has exemplified in many ways the higher attributes of "Good Fellowship." It was a handsome eulogy and struck a most responsive chord in the large assemblage.

The Marshfield Aerie of Eagles and the Marshfield Odd Fellows attended in a body, the deceased having been a member of both orders.

In compliance with a final request made by Mr. McCutcheon, Director Fenton had the band render Chopin's Funeral March and this with a few other selections, including solos, of Sacred Music constituted the program.

WHO WERE THEY?

Marshfield Reported Mixed Up in Coquille Trouble.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "On Wednesday night at the Oregon rooming house occurred one of the most disgraceful happenings in the history of Coquille, if our information is correct. We are told that several Marshfield young men, who were here in attendance at court as witnesses in a case now at trial, after imbibing too freely of intoxicants, went to a room in that building and, through the walls of their room offered unnamable insults to two vaudeville actresses, who were playing this week at the scenic. The actresses had the room adjoining that of the young men, we are told, and were compelled to listen to the profane and indecent language and remarks of the men until the night marshal could be found and the orgie stopped.

"Warrants for the arrest of the young men were sworn out in the recorder's office yesterday and they will no doubt be speedily apprehended, as they are said to be well known in Marshfield. We are informed that they departed early yesterday morning on foot down the track, and presumably took the train at Beaver Hill for their home town.

"In addition to the insults offered the young women it is said they tore down the bed in one room and transferred it to the room from which their ribald remarks were thrown at the actresses. For this we are told a second action will be begun unless the damage is paid for promptly."
