FLORENCE SEES MEAT FAMINE IN PROSPECT

Owing to Growth of Dairy Industry Reef Cattle Are Hard to Find. FLORENCE, Feb. 4.—Kenneth

McCormack, who owns the meat market here, may temporarily close his shop, leaving the town without any place to buy beefsteak, unless it patronizes the shop at Mapleton. Last year the town supported two meat markets, but competition at Mapleton and the increasing price of meat led to the closing down one of these, Reddy's shop, in October.

McCormack has several two-yearold steers, which, as they are grow-ing rapidly, he can't afford to kill for the price he now receives for meat and the price cannot be raised without a serious falling off in customers. This situation has led to his determination to shut down for awhile.

Owing to stockraising having enerally given way to dairying on the Siuslaw meat at any price is hard to get and what the rail-road companies will do in the spring is a question.
