TO ENLARGE BANDON.

Plan to Extend City Limits to Include Large Area.

This petition also took in a number of the property owners along the plank road toward the Lyons Johnson mill and in all, will include a territory about one-half mile east of the present city limits and from Eighth street it will extend over a mile north. The petition will be up before the city council at the next meeting and will no doubt be acted upon favorably by that body."

The schooner Randolph has been due to arrive at Rogue River for a number of days, with badly needed supplies.

The sad news has reached this place of the death of Mrs. Joseph A. Haines, at Monmouth, Polk County, where herself and husband were spending the winter. With her husband, she settled on a stock farm at what is now called Eckley, Curry County, in 1869, and has lived there since, with the exception of a few short sojourns in the valley. She was a brave, warm-hearted, hospitable lady and in the early days, when neighbors were few and far between, the latch string was always out at her home, and many an old pioneer, miner, prospector and wanderer still living will remember with gratitude the hearty welcome and kind and motherly treatment received at her hands. She was the mother of fourteen children, twelve of whom, we think, are still living.

A report is going the rounds of the press of the state that the county court of Curry County had recommended the bonding of this county for the sum of 80,000 to be expended in road improvement, and that an election will be held to vote on the question; and the people of Curry are being highly commended for their enterprise. The county court proceedings as published contained no such recommendation, the official organ of the court has never mentioned the matter, and few have been able to find any person who is wise to the subject. NEWS OF FLORENCE

Items of Interest From the Siuslaw West.

Wm. Kyle & Sons Co. are arranging to build a large warehouse to make room for their increasing business, and intend to have it erected as soon as the necessary lumber and other material can be procured. Their plans are for a building 180 feet long and 40 feet wide, to be constructed of corrugated iron. It is to extend from the present warehouse adjoining the cannery, north to Front street.

The steamer Roberts was brought to Florence last Friday, the steamer Lillian pulling the vessel off the bank and towing her down the river. The boat was taken across the stream and beached on the Glenada side so the propeller shaft could be taken out and replaced with a new one. The propeller was picked up where it had been dropped when the shaft broke.

FLORENCE SEES MEAT FAMINE IN PROSPECT.

Owing to Growth of Dairy Industry Beef Cattle Are Hard to Find.
FLORENCE, Feb. 4.—Kenneth McCormack, who owns the meat market here, may temporarily close his shop, leaving the town without any place to buy beefsteak, unless it patronizes the shop at Mapleton. Last year the town supported two meat markets, but competition at Mapleton and the increasing price of meat led to the closing down of one of these, Reddy's shop, in October.

McCormack has several two-year-old steers, which, as they are growing rapidly, he can't afford to kill for the price he now receives for meat and the price cannot be raised without a serious falling off in customers. This situation has led to his determination to shut down for awhile.

Owing to stockraising having generally given way to dairying on the Siuslaw meat at any price is hard to get and what the railroad companies will do in the spring is a question.
