NORTH BEND NOTES.

The North Bend Commercial club has taken steps to reorganize the old North Bend Chamber of Commerce and engage a hired secretary to boost the city. C. S. Winsor, E. F. Russell and A. H. Derbyshire were appointed a committee to take charge of the matter. Dr. Hartle, J. W. Grant and N. C. McLeod were appointed a committee by the North Bend Commercial Club to have the old road to Empire changed so that it will follow a course directly west from Broadway to Banzon on Newark street. Road Supervisor Perkins says he has sufficient funds on hand to make the change if the county court will approve the plan.

City Recorder Derbyshire reports that John E. Price & Co., bond buyers, have notified him that a special election will have to be held by North Bend to legalize the excess of outstanding warrants before bonds can be sold to take the warrants up. There are about \$35,000 worth. It is proposed to hold the special election about May 1.

L. J. Simpson, E. W. Wood, C. S. Winsor, H. G. Kohn and A. Van Zile have been appointed a special committee by the North Bend Commercial club to try to secure the erection of a \$50,000 hotel in North Bend. It was stated that the vacant block opposite the North Bend city hall would be vacated and dedicated as a free site. It was suggested that a local stock company be organized to erect the hotel in case no outside parties could be interested.

Charles Brandal has bought an interest with Emil Kardinal in the Superior Bakery in North Bend and the business will be enlarged.

There is about 880 acres in the tract and the stand of timber is about 50,000,000 feet. It is the last large tract of timber on tidewater on Coos Bay. The Merchant estate held it at \$2 stumpage or \$100,000 for the tract.
