
State Superintendent of Schools Asks

to Have it Observed. State Superintendent L. R. Alderman has written to each of the county school superintendents of Oregon asking them to aid in preparation of programs on February 12, Earth Education day. He believes that the schools and school authorities should support senate bill 72, which provides state approval in aid of the scheme of industrial practical training, which was supported by contributions of citizens last year. He says in his letter to the superintendents:
"It is desired that we have exer-

cises in the schools February 12, on industrial education, the day to be known as Earth Education day. Last year thousands of our Oregon children had gardens and made exhibits of their products as well as of other work of their own hands. These contests showed that our boys and girls can do these things. This year we want to show the people what we can do when we all take part.
