Twin City Auto Stage Line



Jerry Kinney, formerly with the Palace Cafe, has inaugurated a new automobile stage line, between Marshfield and North Bend. The service is known as the "Twin City Stage Line," and starts with two seven-passenger Cadillac machines and will have more if the service warrants it. He inaugurates a round fare of 25 cents between the two cities. This, he believes, is all the service justifies since the new waterfront road reduces the time and also the cost of the service. He has made arrangements for the through service only, leaving the local service to the local auto but in case of an emergency will provide local service for through patrons.

MARSHFIELD'S EQUITY IN MILL SLOUGH.

Editor Coos Bay Times:

Further reference to the equity of the public in Mill Slough and in confirmation of same, which latter is, of course, a matter of record.

The Commission of New Sources of City Revenue appointed in 1911, has reported and recommended an annual tax of 1 per cent on the increases of land values in the city of New York.

Said tax to be an addition to the general tax levied upon all real estate and to be perpetual upon all increment or unearned land values.

77 per cent of the municipal taxes of the city of New York are derived from real estate, as compared to 71.6 in Boston and 42.4 in Chicago. Chicago is now bankrupt, and could anything be more ridiculous?

In the last ten years New York real estate has increased in value \$150,000,000 each year. A 1 per cent tax on this increase will give the municipality for public purposes the enormous sums of \$1,500,000 the first year, \$3,000,000 the second year, \$4,500,000 the third year, \$6,000,000 the fourth year, and up to the tenth year, which

would approximate \$15,000,000. This much for the people and their community, for its improvement, caused solely by the influx of population and not in any other way. The aggregate of these sums collected in ten years time, and of necessity spent in its own community amount to over \$70,000,000 of dollars, and this, mind you, represents only 1 per cent of the increased value of the lands within the city, caused by the increased population, the other 99 per cent unearned, remains in the hands of the individual investor, in return for a paltry and ridiculous tax. This individual frequently lives elsewhere, and is of no earthly use to the community, if he remains here (until the railroad comes, of course he will sell out then and go, or just before, and take his "ill-gotten gains" with him) he poses as a good citizen, talks railroad by the road (because it will sell his idle lands to great advantage to him) and otherwise opposes every progressive step to the common good.

Remember there is a difference between the builder speculator and the idle land speculator. One is a worker, the other a leech. If instead of spreading his money as far as he can make it reach over idle land, and making of himself and his vestment a detriment to the community, he builds or puts his money in industries, so people will accumulate, make homes and increase the population, the railroads will come unasked and everything else will come, as it always does, where the people congregate and without them nothing comes, not even his increment price, or the railroads either. He can take this from one who knows.

Will the city fathers please investigate and tell us what percentage of the municipal tax in Marshfield is paid by real estate in proportion to personal property, licenses and improvements? We know why the

CATCH MANY SMELT.

Big Run of Fish in the Columbia River Now.

The Portland Telegram says: "Think of catching 1,200,000 fish in one day. That was the catch of Columbia River smelt at Cowlitz Sunday. The only reason that more smelt were caught Sunday than yesterday was because more people are out after them."

"The smelt run is now on in earnest, and the market is glutted with this most delicious fish. Smelt can be had three pounds for a dime, and some places give even more. On the Cowlitz, if you don't want the fun of catching the smelt you can buy 50 pounds for 25 cents, or even 15 cents, or a plug of tobacco or a good cigar, or any other trifle."

"Since the smelt began running the high water mark was reached Sunday when 60 tons were caught and boxed for shipment. The express company was swamped and motorboats and steam launches were pressed into commission to transport the fish to Portland. Ranchers, villagers, storekeepers, boys, women and girls flocked along the Cowlitz Sunday and armed with dip nets filled boats to the sinking point."

RECEIVER FOR COPPER CO.

One of Heinze's Corporations is in Trouble Again.

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—Receivers were appointed in the federal district court today for the United Copper Company. Appointments were made on petition of Maurice DeLoach, receiver of the Aetna Indemnity Company, F. Augustus Heinze, president of the company, which has been involved in litigation since the panic in 1907, when its stock collapsed on the curb. The capital issued is \$10,000,000, of which \$50,000,000 outstanding owns properties in Utah, Montana and British Columbia.
