NEW AUTO TAX PLAN.

The Coquille Sentinel says the following petition to the legislature is being circulated there.

We, the undersigned legal voters and residents of Coos county, Oregon, respectfully ask your honorable body to amend the laws regulating the license of automobiles, motor vehicles and chauffeurs in such a way as to cause the county clerk in each county in which the license is applied for to issue said license in the road fund of such county and to be used in the improvement of the public roads of such county.

PARCEL POST VS. GAME LAWS.

Wardens Cannot Tamper With the Game Sent by Mail.

There is a possibility that Uncle Sam's parcel post and the game laws of the different states may not work smoothly together. What is troubling the Audubon societies and those appointed to see that the game is protected is the fact that birds, fish and animals, if not weighing more than 11 pounds, or even a wild buck, if cut into 11 pound pieces, can be shipped by parcel post as readily as a peck of oats.

There is plenty of law against that sort of prostitution, but the catching of violators is where the rub comes in. It is comparatively easy for game wardens to keep an eye on express and freight packages, but our new friend, the parcel post, is an entirely different proposition.

The game warden may properly examine and confiscate unlawful shipments by express or freight. But the mailing of a package is a secret between Uncle Sam and the sender. Not an unauthorized hand is permitted to touch it or tamper with it in any way. Nor are any questions concerning other people's mail answered by postal employees.

So the Audubon society people are greatly wrought up over what may happen to the birds and beasts.
