NATIONAL AREA INCREASES SIDE OF CASE

16,500,000 More Board Feet Cut During Last Six Months of 1912 Than for 1911.

16,500,000 board feet of timber was cut during the last six months of 1912 over the amount cut during the corresonding period of the previous year has been completed by the officials of the United States forestry service, which has juris-diction over the national forests of the Sixth district, comprising Alas-Washington and Oregon. It is anticipated that the cut from the national forests of the district dur-ing the remainder of the present fiscal year will be much greater on account of a number of large sales 65,857,000 board feet, valued at \$120,158.97.

Sale transactions recently proved and now under advertisement or application involve over 384,000,000 board feet worth not less than \$668,712.

These, however, iculude only the By far the large transactions. in small amounts to homesteaders and ranchers for domestic use.

During the fiscal year that ended June 30, 1912, the total number of national forest sales was 656. Eighty-five per cent of these, however, were sales of \$100 or less, the material being used for domes-

In each sale the timber to be cut is marked by a forest officer so that a natural sowing for a second timber growth is provided for.

The present law provides that 25 per cent of the receipts from National forest timber sales and other revenues from the National forests shall go to the county in which the National forest is located for the road and school fund and an additional 10 per cent for the im-provement of the main highways. The benefit of this steady increase in the amount of timber sales is therefore enjoyed at home.

I. O. Stemmler Makes Statement About Burr Larceny Trial at Myrtle Point.

Editor Coos Bay Times: We observe in the issue of your paper of the 7th, instant, an interview purporting to have been with Mr. John D. Goss, relative to the arrest and binding over to the grand jury of Messrs, James Brock and A. S. Riggs,-and assuming that it is your aim to publish facts only, we take this means of correcting a false

impression left in the article.

Mr. Goss is reported as branding this affair as an outrage, and if the undisputed evidence as given by several witnesses upon the examination, is true, every fair minded man would fully agree that the affair was an outrage.

The facts, as testified to, were about as follows: Mr. Walls had purchased of Willet & Burr, a tent. tools and provisions to the amount of \$230.00, and had cleared something over two acres of land for them for which they had agreed to pay him \$100.00 per acre, and to furnish him, monthly, the engineer's report showing the amount due him for work. He had worked from the 24th day of November, 1912, but, was never able to secure from the company, any such report, and, had nev-er recived one farthing for his en-tire winter's work. He had already sent for his wife and children to join him here. His tent was on land belonging to Mr. C. E. Morris, whose permission he had to let it remain there. The tent was locked and his

provisions inside it. One day, the 25th day of January, last, Mr. Rigs notified him that unless he turned his tent, tools and provisions over to the company, he would be arrested and sent to the penitentiary, whereupon he went to Coquille and conferred with Mr. Liljeqvist, to learn from him what his legal rights were, and while thus ab-sent, the defendant's cut the tent about the lock, tore it down and took it, together with all his tools, provisions, and some other property he had purchased from other parties, and moved them away to their own store houses, and upon demand made upon Mr. Burr, a return of the stug

was refused. None of these facts were denied by the defendants or by anybody else. and Mr. Liljeqvist was of the opin-ion, and so advised, that this constituted larceny, and it was upon this state of facts that the defendants were arrested and bound over, and the Justice of the Peace could not, without having violated his oath of

office, have done otherwise. So far as our conduct of this case is concerned, we have no excuses or apologies to offer, as it is, at best, most distasteful to rush into the public press, there to try out legal issues, and we make this statement only in fairness to Justice Dodge, before whom the examination was held.

We will say further that Mr. Walls denies being an I. W. W., and says he does not belong to any labor un-ion; but, were a man, because poor and friendless, denied the protection of the law, as Mr. Goss infers he should be, honest men would soon turn anarchists.

Let it be understood that in this communication, we make no accusations against any of the defendants, as they may be able, upon an intro-duction of their evidence in defense, to show that in their appropriation of this property, they were doing Mr. Walls a kindness, and that they are in no wise guilty of larceny, as charged; but as the evidence stands at the present moment, it would have been a miscarriage of justice and a prostitution of his office, for Justice Dodge to have donce otherwise than as he did.

The demand for dairy products made in this particular section far exceeds the supply, and farmers throughout the valley are turning their whole attention dairying, realizing the great advantages and rich compensation this fertile valley offers and returns to those specializing in this branch of farm life.
