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GRANT'S PASS NEW RAILWAY

City Pays Railway Construction Work Pending Bond Sale.

GRANTS PASS, Feb. 13.—At the meeting of the council a special fund to be known as the railroad and construction fund was created, and the treasurer was instructed to transfer \$2500 from the general fund to the new account.

A second resolution directs that all bills and claims on account of the expense of building the municipal railroad from Grants Pass south to the Applegate river now or hereafter incurred shall be referred to the public utility commission.

Up to February 1st all bills for all departments of the P.-I. work amounted to \$1,738.07, vouchers for which are in the hands of the commission. The engineering department since the office was first opened has contracted bills amounting to \$527.05, this figure including the office and field expense. For clearing right of way and all other items coming under the head of the grading account, bills for \$1,191.79 are vouchered, while for printed supplies, etc., \$18.75 is charged.

From fifteen to eighteen men are employed on clearing the right of way, the pay roll to date amounting to \$858.48. To show for this expenditure, 34 acres of right-of-way have been cleared, including that portion from station 81 to station 230. The workmen are now just across the Jerome Prairie road.

Twenty-two bond buying firms have made inquiry regarding the \$200,000 bond issue, and some of the firms will send their personal representatives here.

THIS WEE GIRL IS LIGHT AS FEATHER

Los Angeles Infant Weighs 48 Ounces and Takes Only 45 Drops of Food.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 11.—Because she weighs only a trifle more than 48 ounces, and requires but 45 drops of specially prepared food to give her a square meal, Rosanna Elizabeth Johnson, who opened her eyes upon this world last Wednesday, has achieved most distinction than any other baby ever cared for at the Los Angeles Maternity Cottage.

She has an allowance from the county board of supervisors. Seven wealthy women, members of the board of managers of the Maternity Cottage, and a number of physicians dance attendance upon her. She has a specially built "baby incubator" and a retinue of nurses. She has all of this because she is the eighth child of her parents, and the only one who has lived more than two days. The women of the cottage board of managers determined to make an exception in the rule of death in her family.

"HELLO" SUPPLANTED ON PHONE BY "HOW DO YOU DO"

EVANSTON, Ill., Feb. 13.—Many residents of Evanston have placed the stamp of disapproval on the word "hello" as a salutation over the telephone.

Girls in the telephone exchange say that the word is considered "vulgar." "Good morning," "good afternoon," or "good evening" have taken the place of the shorter and handier word as a form of greeting. "It is seldom that I ever hear a 'hello' any more," said a girl in the telephone manager's office. "In the course of a day I call the homes of many society women and in almost every instance I am answered with the greeting 'good afternoon' or 'how do you do.'"

THIEF OWN BOOKKEEPER.

Young Man Makes Full Confession and Officers Recover Loot.

MEDFORD, Feb. 14.—A new wrinkle in criminal annals, in which a burglar systematically kept books on what he stole and what he expected to steal has been unearthed by the local police force in the capture of Frank Kelly, a young man of 23, who has resided some time on West Eleventh street. Kelly after his capture made a full confession and produced his "books." A list of all he has stolen together with the dates on which he broke into the places, was found. Opposite the list is the price of each. At his home at 710 West Eleventh street the officers found more than two wagon loads of loot. Kelly's list of stolen articles is unique. It looks like a bill for groceries and is very complete. He has "accounts" with Warner, Wortman & Gore, B. & C. Cash Store, Public Library, where he stole oil, Big Pines Lumber Company and a number of orchard companies in the valley.
