## WILL BE A BIG YEAR FOR AUTOS

Coos County Continues to Buy Cars at an Increasing Rate.

"This promises to be the biggest year in the auto trade in the history of Coos County," remarked George Goodrum in response to a question as to present and future prospects. "The great difficulty is going to be to get cars, unless orders are placed early." Mr. Goodrum continued, "This is true not only here but all over the country. I noticed in a recent interview that Henry Ford, president of the Ford Motor Co., says these conditions prevail everywhere. He says that most of the big companies have sold all cars they could manufacture without any intensive prospecting for prospects. The Ford Motor Company for the past two years, despite its huge output, has sold its cars many months before the end of its manufacturing year, and could have sold many more had it been able to build them. This year the same condition will be true. "Today it does not seem to be so much of a question selling cars, as it is of building them in sufficient numbers to supply the ever increasing demand." "My advice would be that any intending purchasers should place their orders as soon as possible to avoid disappointment later."
