Order Motors—It is stated that Manager Nordrum of the C. A. Smith pulp mill last week placed an order for \$9,800 worth of electric motors to be installed in the new plant.

Plan Anniversary—At a meeting of Myrtle Lodge, Knights of Pythias tonight, it is expected that plans will be made for celebrating the anniversary of the lodge on February 22.
