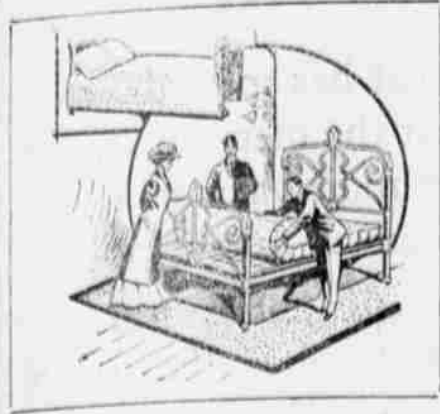

Improve Camp—The Noble pile driver will be taken to South Inlet this week to do some work for Manager Best of the Estabrook Co. on the railroad tie camp on Henry Sengstacken's ranch.

Snow in Hills—Del Catheart, who has just returned from the head of North Coos River, where he has been doing some surveying, says that in some of the shady gulches of Elk creek there is still 10 to 15 inches of snow.

Improve Building—The R. H. Olson building on North Third street, occupied by Wilson's undertaking establishment, is being overhauled and improved. A new entrance is being built and the appearance of the structure improved.

Ducks Plentiful—Hunters report that canvasback ducks are unusually numerous around the Bay this year, more being killed than during any season for over twenty years. Bluebills are also numerous. The duck season closes on March 8.

Basketball Games—The Bandon High School basketball team will play the Marshfield High School team here Thursday night and will play North Bend at North Bend Friday night. The Marshfield High School girls will probably play a preliminary game.

Makes Survey—E. L. Robinson is making a survey of South Inlet to show the necessity of improvement in the waterway. The residents there at a recent meeting decided to ask the county commissioners and the Port Commission to make some improvements in it.

Business Increasing—Postmaster Curtis reports that the parcel post business to and from Marshfield is constantly increasing. Many unique packages are being received, one received the other day being a package of bacon sent from England to relatives here.

Deal Closed—All of the negotiations for the purchase of a controlling interest in the North Bend mill by the Swayne & Hoyt interests have been completed and they will immediately begin remodeling and plan to put a large vessel on the run here to handle the output and also to engage in the freight and passenger business between here and San Francisco.

Charity Work—E. L. Brice is circulating a petition today to raise money to send J. A. Cooley to Lane hospital in San Francisco. Mr. Cooley, who was operated on several months ago has been unable to work since and needs medical help. The public has been generous in its donations to the support of the family, but Mr. Cooley needs personal assistance. There are six little children.

Big Supply—Jay Tower was informed the other day by a salesman for a rubber tire company that the Gunney in Marshfield carries the largest stock of auto tires carried in any town in Oregon outside of Portland, with the exception of an auto jobbing house at Medford. One reason for it is that the other towns having railway facilities can get orders for tires quickly filled from the Portland supply houses.
