### RAILROAD TO NEHALEM READY TO START WORK.

ASTORIA, Ore., Feb. 20.—Articles of incorporation of the Columbia & Nehalem River Railroad Company were filed in the office of the County Clerk. The incorporators are J. C. and A. L. Veazie and J. H. Hendrickson, and the capital stock is \$1,000,000. The road will be built from Wood's landing, in the eastern part of the county, to the Nehalem Valley, a distance of about thirty miles, and the motive power will be either steam or electricity. A. S. Kerry, representing the Blodgett Company, having large timber holdings in that section, is said to be back of the enterprise.

### ASTORIA POLICE FORCE WILL NOT BE REDUCED.

ASTORIA, Feb. 20.—The city council, by a vote of 6 to 3, passed a resolution which puts a quietus on the proposition of reducing the police force, which has been debated at the past two or three meetings of that body. The members of the health and police committee were the only ones voting against the resolution.

### THE TRIAL OF M'ALLISTER

**Evidence About His Attempted Flight Can't Be Considered.**

The Portland Telegram says: No evidence of the attempted flight of E. S. J. McAllister, attorney, after the first indictment had been returned against him as a member of the vice clique, will be allowed to go before the jury for its consideration in the present trial. This was a point gained by the attorneys for the accused after an extended argument. Judge Kavanaugh ruled this evidence to be inadmissible.

When McAllister was indicted the first time, three months ago, he was in Marshfield, engaged in the trial of a case. He was informed of the charge against him by wire, and replied that he would return at once to Portland to face his accusers. On the return trip, however, after arriving by stage at Drain on the Southern Pacific, he took a train south, ostensibly bound for California. He was arrested and placed in jail at Medford, where he was held until bail had been provided for him by his law partner at Portland.
