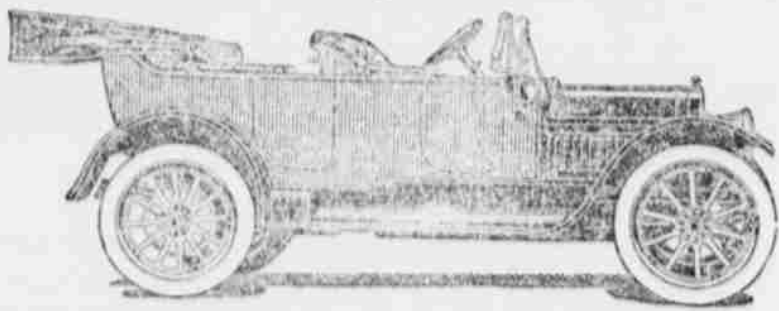
Dr. J. T. McCormac writes Benkeley, Cal., that he and Mrs. McCormac may come here about the first of April for a short stay.
