## CULLINGS OF COQUILLE.

### Coos County Seat News As Told by The Sentinel.

James Richardson of Parkersburg was in Coquille Wednesday. He has recently rented his ranch of 237 acres at that place to Dominghini Brothers and J. Lockernini.

Bowman and Miller, who have a cheese factory at Parkersburg, are preparing to resume operations in the near future. Mr. Miller, who has been east on a visit, is expected home within a fortnight.

Mr. Golden will materially improve his Front street building, Bayliss & Langston have the contract, and work will be commenced as soon as they complete the new city hall.

Health Officer Culin reports thirteen births and seven deaths in Coos County for the month of January.

Pete Olsen, a native of Denmark, and for about forty years a resident of Coos County, died at Grayce hospital in this city on Tuesday, aged 77 years. He has been a fisherman and sailor. At the time of his death he was a county charge. Death was caused by heart failure.

Jeff D. Wilson, of Grayce hospital, has received a communication from Mrs. J. C. Carbus of Monroe, Oregon, in which she makes numerous and divers inquiries about her husband, whom she supposes died here some time since, but of whom Mr. Wilson has no knowledge.

Captain Willard, of the river craft Wolverine, sustained a painful injury on Tuesday while making some minor repairs to the boat. He was tightening a clutch with a monkey-wrench when the implement slipped from his grasp and dropped into a revolving wheel, which threw it with great force against his forehead, cutting quite a gash.

The Methodists have in view for the not very distant future the erection of a magnificent new edifice of worship, and while no definite action is likely to be taken for some months to come it may be considered a certainty. It is deemed advisable to dispose of this site when the proper time arrives and erect a modern building on the two lots owned by the church near the courthouse. It is not probable that any action in this direction will be taken this year.

### MAY ASK BOND ISSUE \$15,000.

#### Warrants Should Be Liquidated, Thinks Council.

The Coquille Sentinel says: The municipal government, being handicapped somewhat because the charter provides that it shall not incur an indebtedness exceeding \$15,000, is considering the advisability of asking the voters to amend the law at the spring election. The limit has been reached through the purchase of waterfront property and the construction of the new city hall, warrants for which are now outstanding, and the administration desires the privilege of creating a floating indebtedness of 2 per cent of the assessed valuation of the city. The assessed valuation at present being \$560,294 the new order of things would give approximately \$28,000, an amount which would afford this and coming councils considerable more latitude and increase their usefulness.

It is also proposed to submit the question of issuing bonds in a sum sufficient to liquidate the present indebtedness, aggregating \$15,000. Coquille has no bonded indebtedness, which may be said of comparatively few towns of its size, and could easily carry what may be asked for—and then some.

Another amendment under consideration, and one also advocated by Mayor Morrison, is district assessments for certain public improvements, such as bridges across ravines and gulches.

### COQUILLE LIGHT QUESTION.

#### May Be Submitted to Vote of People in Spring.

The Coquille Sentinel says: "The inefficiency and inadequacy of the light plant was briefly considered by the council, in committee of the whole, Monday night, when it was suggested that the city undertake to serve itself, which suggestion had quite strong support. It has been rumored that the present owner, Mr. Morse, contemplates severing his connection with the plant in the spring. It was stated, during the discussion, that the plant and system is priced at \$30,000, and its revenue for local purposes is less than \$600 per month. The mayor thought it might be well to have a committee appointed to investigate the cost of an adequate plant and the revenue that could be derived therefrom and submit a report of its findings that more intelligent action might be taken. The question of public ownership of this utility may be presented to the voters at the spring election.

### MAY PROVIDE FOR PARK.

#### Mayor Morrison Undertakes to Get Playground for Public.

Believing that Coquille is entitled to a municipal playground in the shape of a park, there is a movement on foot by Mayor Morrison and nine other citizens to purchase what is known as the Patterson Grove, consisting of ten acres, and hold the property until such time as the city is in financial position to take it over.
