Plan European Trips.—Several Marshfield people are said to be planning European trips for this summer. Among them are said to be Mrs. Henry Sengstacken and Miss Marie T. Maloney, D. L. Rood and wife are also figuring on an extended trip, which may take them abroad.

Boosts Coos Bay.—Secretary John Motley of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, has received a copy of the annual edition of the West Coast Lumberman of Tacoma. It contains a writeup of Coos Bay and pictures of C. A. Smith, D. C. Greene and Mr. Motley. It is a most attractive issue.

Merge Cafes.—Fred Knudson has sold the Baltimore Cafe to Frank Smallwood of the Merchants' Cafe, who will consolidate the two in the present location of the Baltimore. Mr. Smallwood will conduct the merged cafes alone and that he will make a success of the new restaurant is certain.

Damages Machinery.—Robert Sarter reports that someone broke in to the Twin City Laundry at North Bend last evening and stole a wrench and other tools, after breaking a part on the big washing machine. They have a line on some parties and may have them arrested later.

To Start Work.—The special committee appointed at the annual meeting of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce to solicit funds to maintain the organization, will start work today or tomorrow. The committee will consist of Geo. Rotnor, A. J. Mendel, D. C. Green, Ivy Condran and Hugh McLain.

Coal for Railway.—The tug Roscoe is loading 400 tons of coal at the Libby bunkers here to be taken to Reedsport for the Copenhagen camp. It will also taken another cargo soon to Florence. C. D. Crichton of Porter Bros. arrived here yesterday to take charge of this work, as well as the transferring of heavy machinery for railroad construction.

In Arizona.—Herbert Rogers today received a letter from his father, S. C. Rogers, stating that they are enjoying their stay in Tucson, Ariz., and both feel improved in health. They expect to spend a couple of months more there. Mr. Rogers says that Arizona is not in it with Coos Bay, that he walked for over a mile near Tucson and didn't see even a blade of grass on the desert sands.

Sends Data.—The last of the data relative to the new survey of the Coos Bay bar and inner harbor was sent to Capt. Robert by C. R. Wright on the Breakwater last Saturday by Engineer Charleston, who had the survey in charge. Mr. Charleston expects to receive orders for a survey of the Coquille river in the late spring when the work can be done without being handicapped by freshets.

Is Insane.—James Learmond who came here a couple of years ago from Scotland, is confined in the city jail on an insanity charge and unless he improves will be committed soon. He is said to be also suffering from severe alcoholism. He imagines that he is afflicted with vermin, that the officers want him, that his child is being drowned, etc. He has been "baching" in Bay Park, near the James Forty home. He knew Mr. and Mrs. Forty in Scotland and they have been trying to assist him, and so has A. Landles. He is about 35 years old and has a wife and family in Scotland.

Hearing Not Set.—As yet, the Oregon Railroad commission has not fixed the date of the hearing on the complaint of the cities of Marshfield and North Bend vs. the Coos Bay Water Company. J. C. Green, one of the experts investigating the company, has returned to Salem and stated that it would take Mr. Stubblefield and him a couple of weeks to draft their report on affairs here. As soon as this is submitted, it is expected that the commission will fix the date of the hearing. The Water Company has filed an amended answer to the complaint of Marshfield, stating that the ordinance requiring them to put in new mains and hydrants did not specify the price the city was to pay for the service and further that the mains ordered were in sparsely settled sections that would not pay for maintenance, and that anyway the water service is "good, safe and sufficient."
