**Along the Waterfront.**

The Washington struck another shoal in coming up to Ocean Dock this afternoon and was held up opposite the Standard Oil Dock. She was scheduled to sail for San Francisco this afternoon but owing to the delay she may not be able to get away.

Captain Pete Olson is loading the Rustler for the Siuslaw and will take out general merchandise and coal. She will probably sail tomorrow.

Capt. Erickson of the tug Roscoe, while here yesterday, met some old friends. He had not visited Coos Bay for over 15 years and was surprised to see the changes since then. He formerly ran in here as a member of the crew of the old South Coast and says he remembers the last cargo they had cut of here was largely railroad ties from the old Bay City mill. Capt. Erickson recently succeeded Capt. Tyler on the Roscoe and the latter has not shipped on any other vessel so far.

The Roscoe sailed this morning for Reedsport with 500 tons of coal from the Libby mine for the Copenhagen Brothers steam shovel. Mr. Crichton, who is in charge of the work and also the handling of the machinery for Porter Bros., says they made unusually good time here. He had not made any advance arrangements for the coal, but upon arrival here he looked up A. H. Powers, who arranged with George Doll to hasten the cargo for them. They got loaded and out a couple of days quicker than even Johnson Porter expected. They will return here in about a week for another cargo of coal for the Siuslaw. The Roscoe then may go on the ways at the Kruse & Banks shipyards for a general overhauling.

The Speedwell arrived in Bandon yesterday from San Francisco and will come to Coos Bay early tomorrow morning, and will sail in the afternoon from here.

The Nann Smith is due in late this evening from Bay Point.

**NORTH BEND TO PAY WARRANTS**

Adopt Resolutions Providing for Issuance of Bonds—Special Election.

The North Bend city council at its meeting last evening took preliminary steps for a special election which will be held there the latter part of April to provide for a bond issue to take up the outstanding warrants. One of the resolutions passed provides validating all outstanding indebtedness of the city, there being a question about the legality of the present charter limitations of the debt. Another resolution is re-enacting a section of the North Bend charter when the charter was published, a third amendment to the charter, known as "Section 73A" and provides for the issuance of not more than \$35,000 bonds to pay off all city indebtedness up to February 15, 1913.

**Other Work.**  
 Owing to the uncertainty about the grade on Stanton avenue, the contract for planking Washington street was not awarded last night. Only one bid was received and this was not opened. The Southern Pacific has not yet finally established its grade across Stanton so that the city cannot establish its grade.

E. Hobson was engaged to do some engineering for the street committee in place of Col. Brigham, who is ill.

The street committee was instructed to have the Oregon Power Company put in its lights and poles on the same side of the street in all parts of town.

**Repeat Wharfage Fee.**  
 City Attorney Mullin was instructed to draft an ordinance repealing the wharfage fees in North Bend. These fees were eliminated last year but were subsequently readopted and now the railroad contractors are objecting to it. Mr. Crichton, who came in this week with the tug Roscoe and barge Nehalem objected strenuously to being taxed \$2.50 to tie up to the city wharf and this led to the council deciding to abolish it. Mr. Crichton threatened to go to Coquille for his coal, as a result of being charged this fee and also because of the high price first asked for the coal but later this was adjusted.

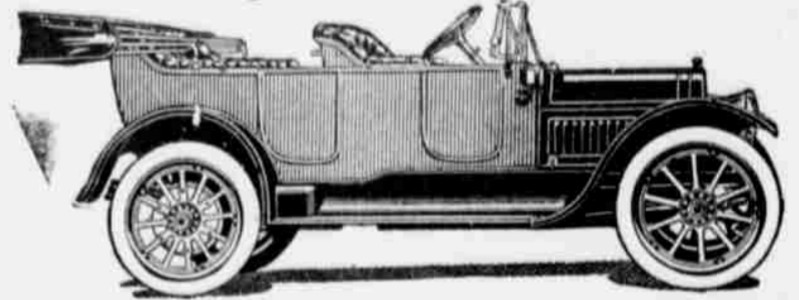

**Twin City Auto Stage Line**



Jerry Klinev, formerly with the Palace Cafe, has inaugurated a new automobile stage line, between Marshfield and North Bend. The service is known as the "Twin City Stage Line," and starts with two seven-passenger Cadillac machines and will have more if the service warrants it. He inaugurates a round fare of 20 cents between the two cities. This, he believes, is all the service justifies since the new waterfront road reduces the time and also the cost of the service. He has made arrangements for the through service only, leaving the local service to the local autos but in case of an emergency will provide local service for through patrons.

He will have his headquarters at the S. S. Jennings store in North Bend, Phone 1151, and at Lillyer's Cigar Store in Marshfield, Telephone 18-J. The service will connect with all boat and train schedules. The regular schedule is as follows:
