The Times Does Job Printing

GIVES DETAILS ABOUT MUCH DISCUSSED CONSUMPTION CURE
AMERICAN MEDICAL JOURNAL TELLS ABOUT DR. FRIEDMANN'S DISCOVERY—NOW BEING TRIED OUT IN NEW YORK.

The following from the American Medical Journal, concerning the Friedmann cure for tuberculosis will be of much interest on Coos Bay as some here are afflicted with the dread disease have been endeavoring to get in touch with the discoverer, who is en route to try out his remedy for Banker Finley, who offers \$1,000,000 if Friedmann cures 95 out of 100 patients.

As previously mentioned in the Journal early in November, the Berlin investigator of tuberculosis, Friedrich Franz Friedmann, reported a new remedy before the Berlin Medical Society, with which he claimed to have had surprisingly favorable experience as a result of treatment of more than a thousand patients. In spite of the repeated demands of speakers who took part in the discussion, Friedmann gave no definite information in regard to his preparation. He injects it mainly subcutaneously and intramuscularly, but also intravenously and subcutaneously. According to his statement, serofulous tumors of the glands, tuberculous abscesses, chronic serofulous eczemas, bone and joint fistulas and especially pulmonary phthisis have been cured. Suppuration is said not to appear in connection with this treatment, as it does after treatment with the Koch tuberculin. The Friedmann preparation has also been used as a prophylactic vaccination in children with hereditary taint. The vaccination consists of a single intramuscular injection; it is said that no injurious action was observed.

In the discussion which followed this report, the statements of Friedmann were endorsed by several observers whose patients in clinics had been treated by Friedmann. Among them were the pediatrician Muller, the surgeon Schleich, the pediatricist Karfunkel and others. The laryngologist Blaschko reported with some reserve as to the results. The urologist Schwenk reported a failure in the treatment of a patient with tuberculosis of the bladder and kidney and denied the apparently good results which were reported by Friedmann in this particular case. Bier, director of the surgical clinic, gained the impression that there is a certain curative action present in this remedy, but he has not as yet seen a conclusive case. The patients treated at his clinic had cases mostly of the fibrous type, and had largely been treated already by operation. He has not as yet seen a cure in a real severe fungous joint case. Orth, who at Friedmann's request took in charge the control of experiments in which infected guinea pigs were treated by Friedmann with his remedy, acknowledged that the animals treated lived considerably longer than the others, but that finally all died of tuberculosis.

A number of experienced investigators warned against exaggerated hopes and expectations. Fritz Meyer, an assistant of his, fails to find the proof of real cure as shown by the tuberculin reaction. He has further not yet seen a proof that

any tuberculous cases can be cured or improved by the Friedmann treatment which could not be improved by the methods of treatment hitherto known, especially in cases of tuberculosis of the kidney and acute pulmonary tuberculosis. He, as well as several other speakers, raised a most lively protest against the prophylactic vaccination, because a vaccine containing living turtle bacilli, notwithstanding their breeding from the turtle strain, may originally have their source in man and thus become later on the cause of a tuberculous infection in children.

Goldschneider holds that there is little evidence as far as the treatment and cure of pulmonary tuberculosis is concerned. He fails to find reports about the status before and after the treatment. On the whole, it is true that the reports of Friedmann have excited much interest, but this has nearly completely been lost by the profession as well as by the public. It takes a different aspect here from that which it assumes in America, where, according to newspaper notices which were sent to me (probably intentionally by interested persons), sensational reports about the curative action of the Friedmann treatment are continually being published. As a basis for the apathy with which further reports of Friedmann are awaited, the following points may be mentioned:

At first, the lack of a definite statement as to the composition of the remedy, to which is added lately also the report that Friedmann will have the remedy patented; then, the complete failures which have been observed since the well-known publication of Robert Koch on tuberculin, in connection with all apparent cures for tuberculosis; further, the criticism to which the remedy was subjected during the discussion by investigators of good repute, and last, but not least, the lack of confidence which has been accorded Friedmann in the scientific world since his previous publications. In 1904 and 1905 he began to experiment with cultures of the turtle tubercle bacilli strain and reported very favorable results which he obtained with this treatment on cattle. Later on, however, he was energetically repudiated by Ruppel, on the ground of this very preparation which Friedmann had given as the evidence of the success of his treatment.

Also Robert Koch felt great distrust of the reports of Friedmann, as he himself told me. Everything considered, it is not surprising that at present, after my inquiries, the remedy is not yet used in a single Berlin hospital. Only Friedmann himself continues his experiments with the remedy on patients in his own clinic. I understand that he contemplates publishing a rather extensive monograph in which all the material together with an accurate protocol will be published.

More will be learned from the patients who will be treated and controlled from the beginning by other observers, however, than from this treatise. Only then shall we be in the position to give an opinion with some certainty as to the value or worthlessness of the treatment. At any rate for the present there is no reason whatever for any enthusiasm, and it would be desirable, in the interest of patients in America if our American colleagues would do what they can to dampen somewhat the enthusiasm roused by sensational reports.

A letter to The Times, she says, enclosed you will find a card of a "made-in-Oregon" bracelet which I arranged in Coos Bay last week for the members of the legislature, and I must say that selecting those to represent the different sections of Oregon I made no mistake in the selection of Senator Ira Smith, who spoke for the interests of Coos county. I have heard many complimentary remarks of the able way in which he handled the subject assigned and am sure he put Coos county in the limelight with those members and guests whom we mentioned with that part of the State. When hearing his talk I am determined to visit there myself shortly and become personally acquainted with the present conditions and future possibilities of Coos county.

Plan of Work.
 Concerning the work of the organization, she says:
 The Oregon Manufacturers' Association has inaugurated a campaign for the betterment and extension of our home industry. Oregon is greatly in need of a larger payroll, and with the cooperation of the men and women through various clubs and organizations the result will be marvelous. The Manufacturers' Association will through the columns of the press endeavor to give national publicity to this campaign. It is our endeavor to create and stimulate the habit of asking for home manufactured commodities of every kind, and when these are unavailable or do not meet with the desired standard, then preference is to be given other Western States.

This Association will look into the factory possibilities of your community and to such give encouragement. Oregon has endless opportunities for more industries if we but make an incentive for their establishment.
 My service has been secured to do the state campaign work and I will soon be my pleasure to visit your city and systematize a plan whereby every housewife, every man and every child will become a booster for home industries. This will be done without any expense to your citizens. We only ask for co-operation.

HOW TO GET WOMEN'S VOTES IS A PROBLEM
Politicians Get Headaches Trying to Figure Out the Solution to the Question.
 PORTLAND, Feb. 26.—Politicians are getting headaches from trying to figure on ways and means of capturing the woman vote. Since the ballot was given to women in Oregon last November, the politicians have devoted their time to studying some system to successfully appeal to these new voters. Particularly enough, the politicians consider the woman vote as a vote which will go in a body one way or another. Thus far they do not believe that the women will act as individuals and that the way is to line up the women is by some special appeal. There is not a prospective candidate, who is not quietly sounding the situation, seeking the best method of securing the woman vote.

Women voters are a new idea in Oregon and from a political standpoint, it is experimental. There are thousands of these voters ready for the candidate who discovers the secret of the right appeal, and it is why the politicians are nervous. It is considered an easy matter to make a mistake. When the returns of the primaries are in next April, the politicians will seize the statistics and analyze them, to discover, if possible, how, and where the women voted and why they voted one candidate as against another; also, the plan of campaign followed by each of the candidates, successful and defeated, will be microscopically examined to see where and how the women vote was attracted or repelled.

Oregonians who have lived in states where women have the franchise explain that the politicians are wrong in assuming that the women will vote as a class by themselves. These citizens state that the women voters simply increase the substantial, invariably, and that, almost invariably, the women rely upon the judgment of their husband, father or brother in selecting candidates. In other words, the women must be had by the same means that the men are secured, the platform, character and party affiliation of the candidates having the usual bearing.
