McMinnville Will Dedicate Carnegie

Building Soon.
McMINNVILLE, Ore., Feb. 25.-Arrangements have been made for the formal opening of the new \$10,-000 Carnegie library, Wednesday, February 26. A short program has been prepared under the auspices of the Civic Improvement Club and the library board. Miss Marvin, of the state library commission, has been invited to be present.

The structure is a two story brick building erected on a sightly location in the city park. The matter of locating the library aroused considerable feeling when the matter of choosing a location was before the citizens. The site was chosen after a hot campaign at a special election.
