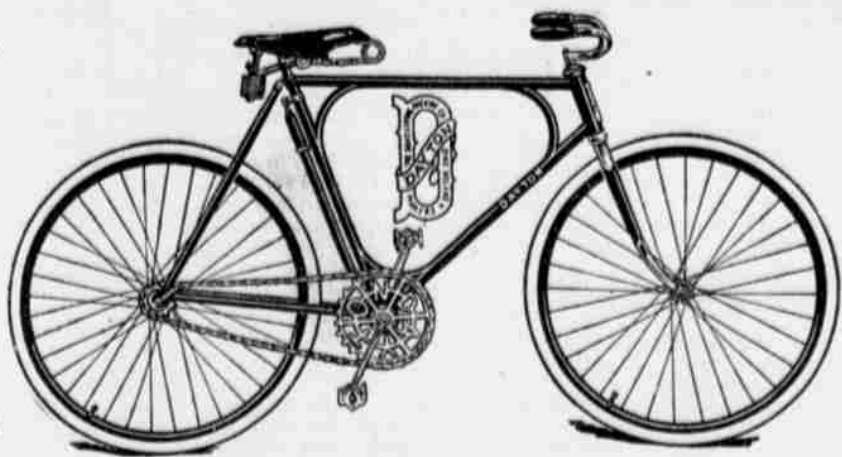

**Fixes Wharf**—Henry Songstacken is having the wharf of his North Front street warehouse improved, and may convert it into a Marshfield dock for the steamer Speedwell, for which he is agent.

**Appraise Estate**—It is reported that the estate of Mrs. Rose Peterson, who died recently at El Verano, Cal., has been appraised at \$14,608.00. She was a sister of Geo. A. Baines and held considerable Marshfield real estate.

**Myrtle Point Building**—It is now an assured fact that Mr. Seaman is to construct a modern business block, either of brick or concrete, adjoining the Guerin Hotel, construction to be started at once.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

**Now in East**—Harry Adler, who formerly travelled through this section, writes friends here that he is now located in New York City and travelling through the east for a new house. He expects to visit the coast in 1915.

**Start Soon**—The Gardiner Mill Company will resume operations in its logging camps soon and another will be started about three miles from the river. A number from Marshfield are planning to go to work there.

**Horse Overboard**—A horse jumped overboard off the Alert yesterday at the landing near the city hall and got in underneath the dock. It required the combined efforts of a score of men to pull the animal out.

**Puter Coming**—S. C. Puter who is here on business is expecting his father, S. A. D. Puter, here in a day or two from Portland. The elder Puter attained much notoriety during the Oregon land fraud case developments a few years ago.

**Wants Tract**—Right of way agent Marsh of the Southern Pacific is negotiating with Carl Albrecht for the purchase of another strip of his tract in North Bend, part of which was condemned as S. P. right of way some months ago.

**Shoals Threaten**—Capt. Macgenn says the survey map of Coos Bay just completed shows that more dredging will have to be done at Lone Tree and North Slough shoals or navigation at the lower stages of the water will be seriously impeded.

**Relative Hurt**—Chas. Jackson received word today that his brother, Andrew J. Jackson, now engaged in the lumber business at Montezano, Washington, sustained a broken leg in an auto accident there recently. Mr. Jackson is a half brother of L. M. Noble of Marshfield.

**Returns Here**—B. R. Keller and wife returned yesterday from a short stay at Portland. While there Mr. Keller made arrangements to represent four large jobbing lines in this section and will travel out of Marshfield. He says that he met many former Coos Bay people in Portland and everyone declares that they are going to return here soon.

**Change Districts**—Supt. Baker has been visiting the schools on Catching Inlet and looking into a movement to change the boundaries of Districts No. 12 and No. 82, it being proposed to transfer some territory from the former to the latter to accommodate some pupils. These and other matters will come up before the county board of education when it meets at Coquille, March 5.

**Snow at Rock Creek**—A party of Marshfield men, who recently filed on homesteads in the Rock Creek country above Remote, passed through here. They have been out about two weeks putting up cabins. In the party were: J. W. Flanagan, W. E. Dungan, Wat Short, Wm. McCabey, G. Goldberg and John Durand. Several feet of snow fell in the mountains recently. Flanagan says the flakes were as big as his hand.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.

**Loss Special Tax**—The adverse decision of the Oregon supreme court on special road district tax levies will knock out about \$15,000 worth of road improvements in Coos county. One Bandon district will be affected, the Allegany-Loon Lake district, No. 8, at Ten Mile, and 18 and 21 in the Myrtle Point section. This is the second time that the Allegany-Loon Lake district has lost out, the other one having been knocked out two years ago on an error in the notice of the special election.

### KILLED BY JAMES GANG.

Father of Mrs. P. J. Bartle of Eugene Slain by Them.

In connection with a report that Frank James, a brother of the notorious Jesse James, and once a member of the noted outlaw gang, has gone into the mountains near Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, to try and recover from consumption despite his 67 years, the Eugene Register prints the following concerning a relative of Dr. Bartle of North Bend:

"Mrs. P. J. Bartle of Eugene has good cause for remembering the James gang, for her father, William Westfall was killed in a hold-up perpetrated in Missouri by these outlaws. Mr. Westfall was a conductor on the Rock Island route at the time of the hold-up, which occurred 31 years ago last July. He saw some suspicious characters on his train which he was in charge of from Kansas City to Trenton. At Winston the gang ordered "hands up," and one bandit, mistaking the conductor's punch for a weapon, fired, shooting Mr. Westfall through the heart. Mortally wounded the conductor walked out on the platform and fell headlong from the train, dying almost instantly. Mrs. Westfall, widowed through the cold-blooded deed of the James gang, is residing in this city with her daughter."
