**NEWS OF NEARBY TOWNS**

Coos County Seat News as Told by The Sentinel.  
The Board of Education will hold a meeting at Stanley's office this evening, when in all probability, a superintendent will be selected for the coming school year. Mr. Howard has given the best of satisfaction during his incumbency and will likely be re-engaged. The question of teachers will also be discussed.

**SALARY THE SAME.**  
Senator Smith Said to Have Knocked Out Proposed Raise.  
The assessor and treasurer of Coos county must continue to perform their respective duties without increased remuneration, the House bill introduced by Representative Barton asking the legislature to grant larger salaries having been killed deadlier than a snail in the Senate by Mr. Smith. The bill, which provided that the salary of the assessor for Coos county be fixed at \$1800, instead of \$1350, as at present, and that of the treasurer of the same biweekly receive \$1500 instead of \$1200, passed the house and had a favorable report by the Senate committee, but Senator Smith intervened and put the kibosh on further proceedings, stating that the gentlemen had known the salary they were to receive prior to their election and consequently should be satisfied with the couch they had prepared for themselves.—Coquille Sentinel.

**LILJEQVIST IS PUZZLED.**  
No Provision in Statute on Coquille Charter Providing for Elections.  
A municipal election will be held in Coquille on the second Monday in May, when several city officials will be elected for the ensuing term, but just how to proceed to nominate aspirants for these positions is somewhat puzzling to City Attorney Liljeqvist. There is no state law covering the subject, and the charter makes no provision therefor. Under the primary system only cities of 2,000 population and over are given consideration.  
Under existing conditions it is probable that when the proper time arrives this city will go the Oregon system one better and adopt a Coquille system in the form of ancient and uncertain ward caucuses. This announcement is made at this time in order that the proverbial "ward healer" may have ample opportunity to build his fences.  
Those ladies who register within the prescribed time limit will have an opportunity to participate in the preliminaries and cast their first ballot on the day of election.—Coquille Sentinel.

**ROBBERY AT RIDDLE.**  
Yeggmen Blow Open Safe South of Roseburg.  
ROSEBURG, March 3.—Yeggmen blew open the safe in the general merchandise store of Langlois & Cutsforth in the new J. B. Riddle building at Riddle. They secured about \$75 in money and escaped. They entered the store by breaking the lock on the front door. Four metallic boxes which the thieves took out of the safe contained the money and some valuable papers. All of the boxes were found broken open in a railroad culvert about one mile north of Riddle.  
EUGENE, March 3.—The safe of the Elmira Lumber Co.'s office in Eugene was blown and about \$30 in cash taken. Many valuable papers in the safe were not molested and several hundred dollars in checks were not taken, but strewn over the floor. Entrance to the building was effected by prying the door open with a jimmy.

The date of the Children's fair has not been set, but will be in next September or October, shortly before the state fair at Astoria. **OREGON TIMBER.**  
Oregon should be cutting more than 6,000,000,000 feet of timber each year by 1914, and in or creating here through the industry from \$90,000,000 to \$1,000,000,000 a year. The industry should give employment to 400,000 men, said F. G. Denson, manager of the traffic department of the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association, at the club luncheon at the Multnomah hotel, Portland.  
Comparing the prospective wealth Oregon should realize, what is now had. Traffic Manager Donaldson pointed out to the fact that the cut of this state last year was about 2,000,000,000, being a value of \$30,000,000, and employing 22,000 to 24,000 men.

**STRANGE REASONS ARE GIVEN FOR DIVORCE.**  
Wife Pulling Him Out of Bed by Whiskers Deemed Sufficient Reason in One Case.  
CHICAGO, March 3.—It is seen to be granted here because of a husband has a wooden leg, and cause a wife pulled him out of bed by the whiskers, because the wife appropriated the husband's personal coffee pot, or because a husband had a beer saloon. A nurse married a sick man expecting him to die, then sued him and secured a divorce on the ground of fraud when he covered.  
In these words Francis Moody, secretary of the Illinois commission on marriage and divorce, characterized before a meeting of the Empire club of Chicago the cause of the present evils which the commission is exerting itself to remove.

**TIMBERLAND CASE.**  
C. A. Smith Company Loses Some Valuable Claims.  
PORTLAND, March 3.—As farwell to United States Attorney John McCourt, who has retired from his federal office today, received notice that 12 valuable timber claims for which he has been litigating, have been awarded to the government by the circuit court of appeals, after being defeated against in the lower courts. The reasonable value of these claims is about \$75 to \$100 an acre, making the aggregate wealth recovered by the government between \$150,000 and \$200,000.  
Eight of the 12 claims ordered returned to the Federal government were held by the Linn & Lane Timber Company, owned by C. A. Smith and associates. Four were the property of the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, having been acquired through some of the McKinley locations of dummy trustees. In the lower courts the claimants had run against the government and a decision was rendered against returning them to the government although acquired without knowledge of the fraud in their title. But the circuit court of appeals holds that the statute does not begin to run against the federal government until the fraud becomes known.

**KEEP MINORS OUT.**  
ROSEBURG, March 3.—Acting upon complaint of a number of townspeople, District Attorney Geo. H. Brown, caused a warrant of arrest to be issued for J. H. Hogan, rest of Oakland, on a charge of allowing minors to play pool in his establishment. Hogan was arrested upon appearing in Justice Marston's court and entered a plea of guilty. He was fined the sum of \$10, which amount he paid without protest. District Attorney Brown says that Hogan's pool hall is but one of the number now in operation in Douglas county that is attracting his attention.
