Issue Fine Prospectus—Secretary Henry Sengstacken of the Port of Coos Bay today received a proof copy of the prospectus issued by the C. W. McNear Company of Chicago, to sell the Port of Coos Bay bonds, which they recently purchased. The prospectus is a fine one, including a map of Oregon and Coos Bay and showing steamer lines. The McNear Company will sell the bonds at 101-40 to 101.65, according to the terms they have to run, making them about 4.90 when the accrued interest is taken into consideration. Secretary Sengstacken wired his approval and asked that 500 copies or so be sent here for distribution. It is expected that the money for the bonds will be turned over to the Port Commission soon.
