Empire Revenue Office Made Subordinate to Portland Office-Taft's Change.

PORTLAND, March 7.-News that ex-President Taft before leaving the White House accepted a report of the Treasury Department for the rearrangement of the customs districts of the United States, through which it is estimated a reduction will be made of from 160 to less than 50, proved of interest to government employes here, as the carrying out of the plan means that Portland will have the only collector of customs in the state, Astoria, Yaquina and Coos Bay being subports.
