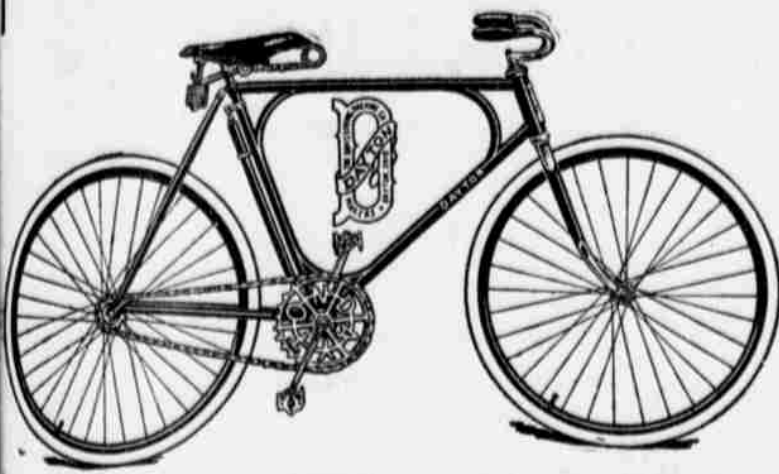

Child Dead—Virgil Young, the youngest child of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Young, died at the home of his grandmother, Mrs. H. Witchey, at Coaledo yesterday. He was three years old. Interment was at Coquille.

Want Improvement—Otto Schetter is today circulating a petition urging that Catching Inlet channel be dredged by the Port Commission, so that the mail will not be delayed. The worst shoals are near Gardiner.

Breaks Arm—Howard Kelly, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Kelly of South Marshfield, sustained a fractured arm yesterday. He tripped and fell. The fracture is a painful one, being of the left arm just above the wrist.

Sells Property—Carl Albrecht has sold the balance of his "triangle" in North Bend to the Southern Pacific for right of way for \$2,000. The company condemned a right of way through the property last fall and have now bought the rest of it.

Clean Jail—Marshal Carter today gave the city jail its "spring house-cleaning," thoroughly fumigating it and burning the old bedding, etc.

Birthday Sunday—Tomorrow is the 78th birthday of C. C. Pratt, father of Vince Pratt. A few of "Grandpa's" friends who have already learned of the occasion have united in extending best wishes and the hope that he will enjoy many more birthdays without age dimming the joy that he radiates with ever good-nature.

Losses Case—The Coos County Commissioners yesterday rejected the appeal of Wallace Crouch for more damages for right of way across his ranch. They allowed only \$50 and Crouch wanted \$1200, but he allowed too much time to elapse without filing his appeal and the county commissioners decided that they did not have the right to grant him further time for appeal.

Likes Railway News—M. D. Poyntz will be pleasantly remembered by many friends he made during his residence on Coos Bay, when he represented a number of jobbing houses. He is now secretary of the Holman Transfer Co. of Portland

Grange Meeting—The Marshfield delegates to the Grange meeting in Coquille yesterday were Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Smith of Coos River, Mrs. Jennie Landrith of North Coos River, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Bessey of the Creamery. The principal business before the grange yesterday was the appointing of delegates to the State Grange meeting at Eugene in May. Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Bessey of the Creamery will represent the Marshfield Grange at that meeting.

Much Lumber Here—The two mills of the C. A. Smith Company are now averaging about 575,000 feet per day, the Eastside mill about 125,000 and the big mill about 450,000. With the Nann Smith and Adeline Smith making five-day trips and the Redondo eight-day trips, it would keep the mills busy to supply them. However, it is said that there is enough lumber piled in the mill yards now to supply the ships with cargoes, with the mills cutting regularly, for six months without the night shifts being resorted to.
