MIRAC II IS RECHRISTENED

Yesterday was a notable date in the marine annals of the world. It was not heralded abroad, but when Commodore E. K. Jones and his gallant crew boarded the Mirac II, for a cruise up Coos River to rechristen the craft it marked a new era in the marine history of the Pacific Coast. The full crew consisted of: Commodore—E. K. Jones, Captain—I. R. Tower, Chief Officer—Jay Tower, Chief Engineer—Ray Kaufman, Boatswain—W. T. Merchant, Steward—E. W. Kamerer, First Officer—R. K. Booth, Wireless Operator—Arthur Peck. The boat which was recently purchased from Dr. I. B. Bartle by I. R. Tower and E. K. Jones made her first trip under the new command and ownership yesterday. The name has been changed from the Mirac II to The Kirk. The name is not taken from the Scotch word for church, but is a family name in the Jones family. The cruise was most successful and the dedication ceremonies were original and interesting. It was impossible to have the log book written up today but a detailed account of the affair is promised later.
