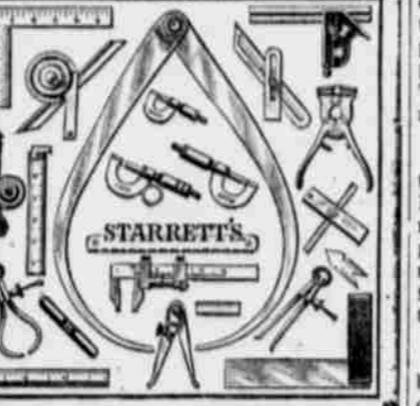

DIES IN CALIFORNIA.
Father of Mrs. W. H. McPherson and Jas. Bering Succumb. The following from a San Francisco paper will be of interest here as James Bering of Marshfield and Mrs. W. H. McPherson are children of the deceased:
John Pierson Bering, the last "John Pierson Bering, the last Society of California Pioneers, died at his home, 776 Cole street, Tuesday, at the age of 85. He had been a resident of San Francisco since September, 1849, having come to the Pacific Coast from Philadelphia aboard the Clarissa Perkins with a company of forty-niners, who sailed to the south fork of the Yuba River, where they engaged in placer mining. Here Bering made a fortune and returned to San Francisco in 1852, entering the warehouse business, in which he remained until his retirement a few years ago.
The funeral was held under the auspices of the Society of California Pioneers.
