Woman Suffrage—Shall Women Vote?
Now that we have it—To vote or not to vote. "That's the question." Though we believe the majority of women are on the affirmative there are some who are opposed.

And why should woman not thus manifest her wish and will for the laws that are to control herself, her children and her property? Well, you say, she has her husband, father and brother to act for her. True, but many women do not think just the same as her male relatives do. Her ideas of right and wrong are often different.

Men are apt to base their actions (regardless of opinion) upon policy, or self interest, while woman would regard principle and final outcome as the main things to be considered. Aren't her children just as near and dear to the mother as to the father?

Who loves, labors and thinks more of her children than the mother?
Who mourns, weeps, passes sleepless nights—whose hair turns white before its time for a son going to a drunkard's doom—manhood lost, a slave to drink, like a mother?

Are not woman's affections, we may add, perceptuous (as a rule) of a finer grade, a purer quality than her stronger (physically) brother? And when we go to the polls, let it not be in a vain-glorious spirit, but, realizing our responsibility as well as our sacred privilege, with pure hearts, a clean conscience and courage-strong, let us cast our ballots and raise our voices for truth, purity, righteousness and peace.
