MAKE LIBRARY COUNTY AFFAIR

PLANS FOR EXTENDING BENEFITS OF INSTITUTION TO THE RURAL SECTIONS CONSIDERED—REQUEST SENT TO CARNEGIE.

Plans for making the Marshfield city library a county library was considered at the last meeting of the library committee. The matter was brought up by a letter from Miss Marvin, secretary of the Oregon Library Commission...

The committee also decided to confer with the Marshfield school board about the latter paying an assistant librarian and extending the benefits of the library further to the school children.

A letter was drafted to be sent to the Carnegie foundation today asking for an \$18,000 donation for a library building in Marshfield.

An offer through Duncan Ferguson by a Brooklyn minister to furnish several hundred volumes of standard fiction to the library if the latter would pay the freight was accepted.

It is announced that Capt. A. M. Simpson has offered his entire library to the North Bend library committee as a nucleus for the library there.

Last Saturday the North Bend high school debaters visited the Marshfield library to secure data for their debate for the Southern Oregon championship.
