**The Servant Girl Problem**

**SERVANTS GOOD ENOUGH FOR DAUGHTERS-IN-LAW**

**Rich Woman Trains Girls in Her Own Home for Marriage With Sons.**

ST. LOUIS, March 19.—Mrs. L. J. Tichacek, wife of a wealthy marble manufacturer and former Missouri state representative, trains servant girls in her home to become wives of her son. She has made three of these matches and they have been so successful that she has plans for keeping her personally conducted matrimonial system in operation until all of her nine sons have taken servants of the family as wives.

The father of this interesting family of nine sons and a daughter also has a system. As each son reaches the age of 16 he is given an interest in the father's business and becomes an active partner in it. Tichacek has just taken his eighth son, Harry, into the firm.

"Their mother finds their wives and I put them in business and everybody is happy," says Tichacek. Mrs. Tichacek has a rule which thus far has never failed her. This is the way she states it:

"If a girl is good enough to work in my household for five years, she is good enough to marry one of my sons."

When a girl has successfully passed through the five years of probation and has shown that she is proficient as a cook and a housekeeper, according to the standard set by this mother of ten, Mrs. Tichacek does not hesitate to recommend her to the eldest son still unmarried as a qualified and desirable helpmeet.

With wise executive foresight, Mrs. Tichacek preserves the line of succession by having always one or more household servants in training when the senior in rank is approaching the end of the allotted five year period.

Friends of the family are commenting with interest on the fact that three of the sons who have reached legal age are still bachelors and that coincidentally a young woman regarded by all of Mrs. Tichacek's woman friends as a paragon of servants has been with the family about five years.

"Our daughters-in-law are as dear to us as our sons," said Tichacek. "Every night they come to our home with their families and we have a party. We make our home so attractive that our sons never go elsewhere to find amusement.

"I have never had cause to regret taking my sons into my business as partners. Day and night we are a happy family."

**SUSIE O'HAGAN HELD DOWN JOB 97 YEARS.**

**"Servant Problem" Easy to Solve If They Were All Like Susie.**

LONDON, March 18.—They have the "servant problem" over here almost, if not quite, as acute form as you have it in the United States, but it would be solved in no time if there were many more domestics like Mary Ann Lancaster, who has just died.

Whether this real "Mary Ann" was a treasure or not you can guess from the fact that she lived as "maid and friend" (according to her obituary notice) with a family in Stoke Newington for 65 years, or up to the day of her death, at the age of 83.

William Sly, secretary of the Domestic Servants' Benevolent Institution, on being applied to, gave the rather surprising information that Mary Ann Lancaster's period of service, though creditable, was far from being a record smashing one, in this country, anyhow.

"It may interest you to know," said Sly, "that we have recorded on our books the case of one domestic who remained with a family for 97 years and another who stayed in one 'place' for 75 years. The first of these was Susan O'Hagan of Lisburn, near Belfast, who died in June, 1909, at the age of 107, and who for 97 years was in the service of three generations of a family named Hall at Lisburn."

**ROY'S LEGS ARE TWICE CUT OFF ON RAILWAY**

**Artificial Limbs Are Run Over as He Rescues Woman Before Train.**

WESTBURY, L. I., March 17.—William Fitting, a 19-year-old lad, lost both of his legs for a second time the other day. The first time was four years ago, when he fell under a Long Island Railway train near the station at Glen Head. On artificial limbs he was standing at the station here when he saw a woman crossing the tracks in front of an express train. Recalling the accident he shouted a warning to the woman, but she did not heed, and young Fitting stamped his way to the tracks and dragged her from danger, only to fall himself across the rails. Other persons on the platform saw the youth run over by the train, and when it came to a stop they rushed to him expecting to find him fatally hurt. He was picked up legless, but not in the least wounded, as the locomotive's wheels had only broken off his wooden legs.

**BOTANISTS TO ROGUE RIVER**

**Noted Scientists to Visit Southern Oregon This Year.**

MEDFORD, March 19.—An excursion that will give the Rogue River valley even more publicity than that of the geographers last year, is that of the International Botanists who will visit this section during the coming season. Dr. F. E. Clements of the University of Minnesota, who was with Dr. Cowles of the University of Chicago, is in charge of the trip, is a personal friend of Prof. O'Gara, who is in communication with him and believes that the society will come here. The International Botanists represent the botanical societies of Europe and the United States and their visit here would be of great importance, as they would not only study the fruit, but the virgin timber. They are interested in tracing the various plant zones and any reports they would make would be given to the world.
