**AUTO PARADE
EARLY TODAY**

TWELVE CARS ATTRACT ATTENTION ON FRONT STREET THIS MORNING.

Front street looked like a section of a metropolis in the vicinity of an automobile show show this morning, shortly after the arrival of the Breakwater. Eight new Ford cars were augmented by four additional local cars and the twelve cars in line made an imposing appearance as they passed down Front street. This shipment of automobiles, which was the largest ever received in this section of Oregon, marks a new record for Marshfield as a coming city and distributing center of importance. It also proved important evidence of the popularity of the Ford cars. George Goodrum, who is Coos county representative for the Ford cars, had the event fittingly commemorated with photographs of the parade, which will make a fine showing. The streets were lined with people as the parade passed and many favorable comments were heard. Of the eight Ford cars that arrived today, two go to Bandon, three to Coquille and three to citizens of Marshfield. Those in Marshfield getting new cars are Jack Dashney, Hugh Sneddon and R. H. Olson, Empire.

In the name of the State of Oregon, you are hereby notified that you are required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled suit, within

six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit:

Within six weeks from the 22nd day of March, 1913, the same being the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail to appear and answer on or before the 3rd day of May, 1913, the same being the last day of the time prescribed in the order of publication, judgment will be taken against you for the relief demanded in plaintiff's complaint, a succinct statement of which is as follows:

First: That there be adjudged to be due and owing the plaintiff from defendant the sum of \$400.00 together with interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from the 7th day of December, 1907, and for the sum of \$50.00, reasonable attorney's fees to be allowed herein and for his costs and disbursements herein.

Second: That a certain mortgage made by defendant dated December 7th, 1907, to secure the payment of a certain promissory note, be foreclosed, and the premises described therein, to-wit: Lot 2 in Block 61

of the Townsite Plat "B" of Coos Bay, as per plat thereof on file and of record in the office of the County Clerk of said County and State, be sold in the manner provided by law, and the proceeds applied to the payments of the costs of said sale and of this suit, and the sums to be due upon said promissory note as secured by said mortgage, and that the defendant and all persons claiming under him subsequent to the execution of said mortgage, be barred and foreclosed of all right, claim or equity of redemption in said premises.

Third: That the overplus if any there be, be paid to the County Clerk of Coos County, Oregon, subject to the order of this court and for such other and further relief as the Court may deem meet and equitable.
