Buys Ranch—The Myrtle Point Enterprise reports that Dr. Geo. E. Dix of Marshfield is interested with Ben McMullen in the purchase of the fine Peirce ranch near Bridge.

Chinaman Loses—A telegram from Boise says that Sing Hosan, the Beaver Hill Chinaman, was badly beaten in a ten round go there by Jockey Bennett of San Francisco last Monday.

Hurt at Mill—A workman at the C. A. Smith mill suffered a severe injury late yesterday while working near the electric crane. His forehead was cut open, requiring several stitches to close the wound.

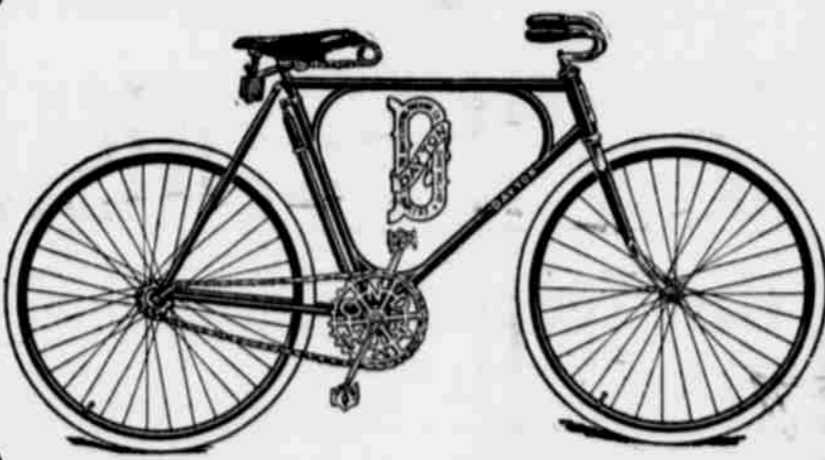
