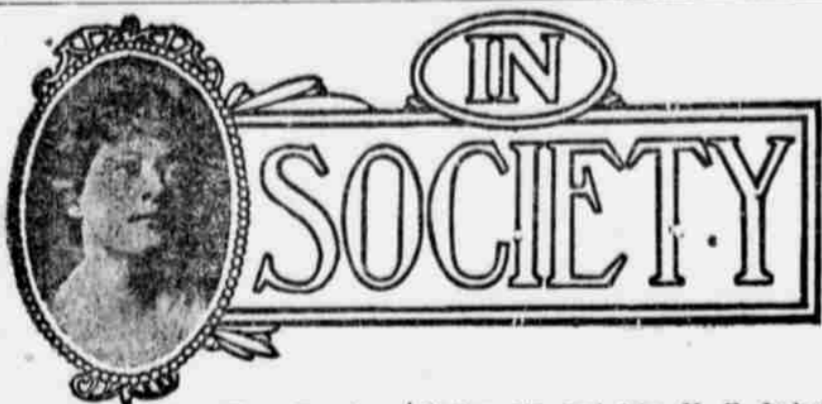

A. E.
