## ELOPING WIFE IS SOUGHT HERE

Green, a resident of British Columbia, who has been on the Bay for several days searching for his wife and little daughter, who left suddenly with a man going under the name of Jackson, has left here without leaving his address, and now information that he desired has been obtained but cannot be forwarded to him. Mr. Green searched here, at North Bend, Bandon, Coquille and other points in vain and finally left for home.  
Green was especially anxious to find them because his wife took some valuable papers belonging to him. He says that he has no desire to get his wife back but that he is very desirous of securing the papers which are of no value to her, but which are very important to him.  
He says that his wife's name was Mabel. She was a rather small woman with brown hair. Their little daughter is about eight years old and has long curly red hair.  
He was quite startled on the street in Marshfield the other day when he caught sight of a little miss with red curls down her back and about the size of his daughter. He thought sure he had found her until he got up close to her and then he found that she was a little girl who had lived here a long time.  
Green thought that the three had come here from Portland, but it seems that they did not. The man in the case had been going under the name of Jackson, but later changed it to Powell.  
Constable W. B. Cox and Chief Anderson of North Bend assisted Green in his search but neither of them got his postoffice address.

## RAILWAY NEWS OF COOS BAY

Although no direct word has been received from Porter Brothers, it is expected that actual construction will be started on the Southern Pacific in North Bend within a few days. It is unofficially reported that the final arrangements between the Southern Pacific and the Simpson Lumber company for the required right of way were concluded at San Francisco yesterday or the day before. L. J. Simpson remaining there to close it.  
Supt. Dixon of the MacArthur Perks company is expected to return within a few days.  
Arehle Phillips, who has had charge of the clearing of the right of way across the park has practically concluded everything preliminary to the actual grading work.  
While the equipment shipped in yesterday on the Breakwater is small it is expected that more and men to operate it will arrive soon.  
Supt. Miller of the local interests of the Southern Pacific said today that he had not been notified just when work would start but expected that it would be soon.  
Probably Johnson Porter, of Porter Brothers, will come in with Supt. Dixon to start the work here. Mr. Dixon will be sort of an inspector on the whole work between here and North tunnel for the MacArthur Perks company, who sublet the contract to Porter Brothers.  
It is understood that definite negotiations between the Southern Pacific and the Terminal Railway, concerning the franchise in Marshfield, will be taken up at San Francisco next week.
