## BANDON CASE IS AFFIRMED

The Oregon Supreme court has sustained the decision of Judge John S. Coke in the case of Dr. H. M. Brown, a Bandon dentist, who was convicted at the December term of circuit court in Coquille and fined \$100 for practicing dentistry without recording his license in Coos county.

An appeal was taken to the supreme court on the ground that the indictment was not specific and that the law was unconstitutional because it discriminated. Judge McBride in his opinion sustained Judge Coke, and holds that the law is not unconstitutional and that the indictment was ample. He says that it is only reasonable police power to require dentists to record their licenses in the county where they practice. Just the same as the law requires deeds to be recorded in the county where the land is regardless of where the owner may live.

### WONDERS FOR WOMEN AT DRESSMAKER'S SHOW.

Latest Gown Is Declared Striking, But Not Likely to Be Popular.

CHICAGO, March 27.—The "cubist" gown is the newest sensation of the annual exhibit of the Chicago Dressmakers' club. Dressmakers attending the fashion show at the Illinois theater smile and declare that the mode is too extreme to be really popular, but they admit its striking qualities.

As for the "futurist" materials, the word belongs to the art world, and the dressmakers have purloined it to meet the need for a name for uncompromising decorations in new weaves. The tulip in futurist silk is a red or yellow flower which might have been plucked from a florist's shop or country garden and pasted upon the silk. The rose, called by any other name, would still be futurist if it had red petals, a green stem and vivid leaves, and these in profusion on light or dark backgrounds.

To describe specifically a "futurist" gown, one was of Indian red silk, with green tulips on the surface. The skirt was draped; that is, caught up on one side. The sleeves were draped, and the lace bodice built over two or three layers of lace and chiffons, also draped, giving soft outlines. A sash of green satin held the skirt drape, and the neck was finished with a lay-down collar of black satin.

### BANKER PARDONED

Last of Taft Pardons a Pittsburg Embezzler.

Montgomery formerly cashier of the Alleghany National Bank of Pittsburg and convicted of the embezzlement of \$469,000 was released from the federal prison here. Sentence on two counts was for fifteen years.

Editor Times: In your issue of the 17th inst. you print an article taken from the Roseburg Review, regarding the action the County Commissioners of Douglas County have taken in reference to the special road tax. It appears that their first decision was to collect the tax, but as the Weyerhaeuser Timber Company threatened lawsuit, the court decided to leave the payment of the special taxes to the option of the taxpayers, and should the county win the law suit the special taxes would be collectible in 1914. But if it should lose, the court would refund the taxes.

In Coos County, these special taxes are of just as much importance, yet the taxpayers are asked to pay, or action will be brought for collection. It seems that the Douglas County Commissioners are taking a step backward? or they have small faith in the validity of the law. However, it would seem that they have taken a very fair means of adjusting the matter.
