**Not With Somers.**—W. P. Murphy denies the report from Grants Pass that he is associated with J. H. Somers, in any railroad project. He says he has not been connected in any way with Somers for over a year and furthermore that the railroad that he is assisting in promoting has not asked any bonus at Grants Pass.

AMUNDSEN RIDES AIRCRAFT

Trip Made with Aviator Christofferson in Hydroplane.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 31.—Captain Ronald Amundsen, discoverer of the northwest passage and the South Pole, experimented today with a hydroplane to determine whether the craft would be of advantage in Arctic explorations. After a trip with Silas Christofferson, the Portland aviator, which was partly on the water and partly in the air, Captain Amundsen said he was not prepared to make any positive assertion concerning the value of the craft in the Arctic, but that he thought it would afford many advantages in the way of determining the best course through the ice floes, and would be useful in triangulation work. He will make other tests before making a decision.

OREGON ATHLETIC DIRECTOR EUGENE, Or., March 31.—Hugo Bezdeck, ex-football coach of the University of Oregon, has accepted a two years' contract to coach all sports here at a salary of \$2,000 a year.
