Father of Mrs. E. W. Sullivan Succumbs in Wisconsin—Probably Due to Trouble.

Word was received yesterday of the death of John L. Justin of Klondyke, Wisconsin, at 9:30 yesterday morning, at the age of seventy-three years. The deceased was the father of Mrs. E. W. Sullivan of Marshfield and Mrs. James Kellond. Besides them a son lives in Portland and one in Seattle.

Mrs. Sullivan received a letter from home a few days ago stating that the home place was under water and it is supposed that the father's death was probably the result of the shock and worry over the flood.

Mrs. Justin died in Marshfield four years ago. Mrs. Kellond will not go East owing to weather conditions.

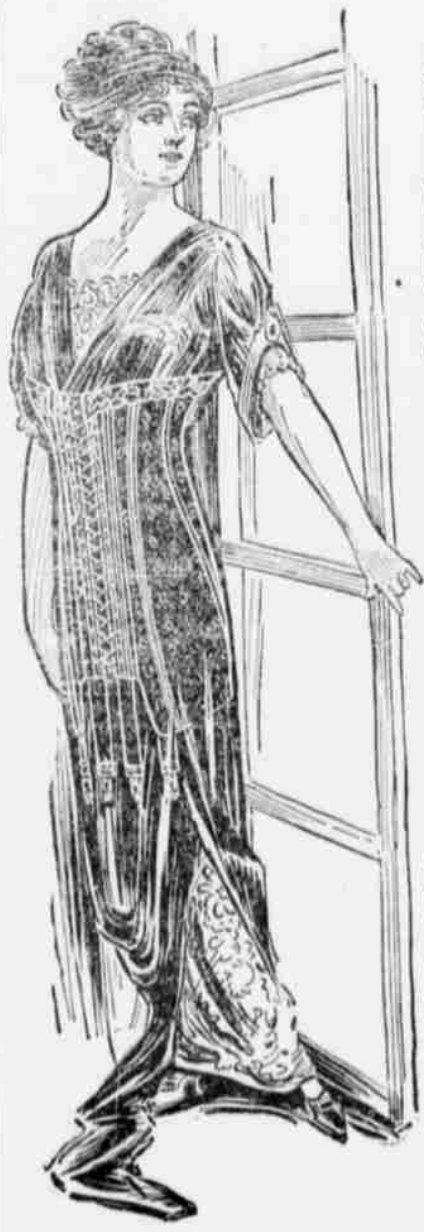

## TO THREATEN MONTENEGRO

England Will Unite With Austria to Force Cessation of Attacks on Scutari.

COLOGNE, April 1.—The naval demonstration of Austria-Hungary and Great Britain against Montenegro will take the form of a peaceful blockade of the Montenegrin harbor of Antivari, according to an inspired dispatch from Berlin. No measures of force are yet contemplated by the powers.

MALTA, April 1.—The British armored cruiser Defence has been ordered to be ready to sail tomorrow to participate in the demonstration to be made by Austria and Great Britain off the Montenegrin and Albanian coasts. The object of the demonstration is to coerce Montenegro into a cessation of their attacks on Scutari.

GERMANY JOINS IN.  
Will Aid in Blockade of Coast of Montenegro Now.

BERLIN, April 1.—The small German cruiser, Brostau, has been ordered by the German government to participate in the blockade of the Montenegrin coast.

SEVENTY AT DAYTON  
Many Bodies Recovered From Flood District Today.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 1.—With the recovery of three more bodies in the wreckage on the west side of the city, the flood list on that side stood at 70 dead. The number of missing remains large. Hundreds of men are at work trying to recover bodies supposed to be buried under the huge hills of wreckage in the vicinity of Greenlawn Cemetery. Martial law has been withdrawn from a considerable portion of the flood area.

## TONG WAR IN SAN FRANCISCO

Aged Chinaman Slain by Gunmen in Celestial Trouble Along Coast.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 1.—Lee Quong Sing, aged 70, was shot and killed by gunmen of a hostile tong in a doorway as he was about to enter today. The murder is the result of a renewed outbreak of the Bing Kong Sney Sing tong war, which has been raging the length of the Pacific coast. A stray bullet shattered the hip of Frank Ghilatta, a bystander. Yee Lik, said to be Bing Kong was captured. Another man escaped.

## WELCOME TAFT TO YALE TODAY

Great Ovation Given Former President at New Haven by Students and Citizens.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., April 1.—Three thousand Yale students headed by a band gave a roar of welcome to former President Taft when he arrived here this afternoon from New York to take up his duties as Kent Professor of Law at Yale University. Taft appeared well pleased with the ovation which continued until he reached the college grounds.

## BODY OF DAN BRUHN FOUND NEAR FLORENCE.

FLORENCE, Ore., April 1.—The body of Dan Bruhn, who was killed January 21, while trying to land the barge Nehalem in the Siuslaw River a mile and a half above Mapleton, was found about six miles from Florence. The body was floating in the water, and was discovered by Ole Minind.

## STRIKE UNTIL HAYWOOD FREE

New Jersey Silk Mill Workers Add Fourth Demand in Their Labor Struggle.

PATTERSON, N. J., April 1.—To triple the demands of the silk mill workers on strike here more men, shorter hours and less labor, there was added today a fourth the release from jail of William D. Haywood, the Industrial Worker of the World leader who was sentenced yesterday to serve six months for disorderly conduct. There will be no resumption of work, the leaders declare, until Haywood is given his freedom.

## CLOSE SALOONS IN NEW YORK

Mayor Gaynor Puts Order Into Effect Closing Bars at 1 O'Clock at Night.

NEW YORK, April 1.—Mayor Gaynor's April first ukase—nothing to drink after 1 a. m.—struck the tenderloin on schedule time early today, causing the worst drought in a decade. In places where the proprietors were inclined to be recalcitrant the police turned lights out unceremoniously and forced patrons out to the sidewalks. Only one arrest was made. ## PLAN FOR RELIEF.

Government Will Establish Base of Relief for Flood Victims.  
WASHINGTON, April 1.—The war department has decided to establish at once near St. Louis, Mo., a floating base of supplies from which relief may be extended with the least possible delay to any flooded community of the lower Ohio or Mississippi. The base of supplies will consist of several vessels loaded with food, clothing and medical supplies.

## NEW PLAN TO SEVER MERGER

President Lovett Wants to Know Conditions Government Will Impose.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—Chairman Robert S. Lovett of the Union Pacific board of directors conferred today with Attorney General McReynolds about a new plan of dissolution of the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific merger. Judge Lovett wanted to learn what conditions the government will insist on.

## SAVE 150 IN ENGLISH SHIP

Passengers Off Agadir Landed Safely Near Mazagan, Morocco, Today.

TANGIER, Morocco, April 1.—The 150 passengers on board were landed safely today from the British steamer Agadir, which went ashore yesterday near Mazagan, Morocco.

## NEW CURRENCY BILLS

Reforms in System Considered by President Wilson and Owen.  
WASHINGTON, April 1.—Senator Owen, chairman of the new Senate currency committee, had a brief talk with Wilson today concerning currency legislation. Owen said while several bills will probably be introduced one measure will be clothed with the administration's support.

## BIG BANK FAILURE.

German Financier Leaves With Heavy Obligations.  
KUESTRIN, German, April 1.—A local banker, Gustav Puppe, suspended payment today with liabilities estimated at \$6,250,000 to \$7,000,000. Puppe and his son have disappeared.

## WANT WILSON TO KEEP WORD

California Suffragette Tells President Women Will Insist on Keeping Pledge.

WASHINGTON, April 1.—President Wilson was told today that the women of the country expected to hold him to his reported declaration that his administration was to be as much shared by them as by men voters. Miss Mary E. Foy, of Los Angeles, president of the California Women's Democratic League, told the President that the women of California were ready to stand by him in his program of legislation and really hope he meant that women would have an active part in the accomplishment of notable reforms. I meant every word of it," the President is said to have told his visitor. Miss Foy, especially the Democratic voters, would support Mr. Wilson's administration "to the last."
