For New Home—Capt. W. A. Magee of the Nann Smith has started excavation for a fine new modern bungalow which he will erect near Ninth and Flanagan, just south of the E. A. Anderson residence, as a home for himself.

Minstrel Ball—The Coos Bay Concert Band have issued invitations for a dance to be given next Friday evening in the Minniah Hall. The affair is in honor of the minstrel casts recently appearing in the Opera House for the benefit of the band.

For Game Warden—Jim Thomas, for a number of years employed in the North Bend mill, is being boosted by local sportsmen for game warden for this section. It is understood that Mr. Thomas has stated that he will accept the appointment and a number of his friends are circulating petitions in his behalf.

Buys Lots—The Coos Bay Home Telephone company has purchased two lots on South Second street, just opposite the Dotson hotel, from Guy C. Barnum. The price was not stated. The company expects to erect a warehouse on the lots to store their supplies in and in the course of a few years may erect a Central Exchange building there.

Meets Old Resident—Dr. C. W. Tower recently met W. T. Barker, a former Coos Bay resident, at Azusa, Calif. Mr. Barker is in charge of the construction of a mountain road up San Gabriel canyon, building it with convict labor, through almost solid rock. Mr. Barker lived at Ten Mile about thirty-five years ago, having taken up a ranch homestead there then.

Trouble Over Line—Dal Cathcart left today to try and locate the section line between Sections 11 and 12, on the east side of Isthmus Inlet. There are two surveys, one overlapping the other by about five hundred feet. Judge Coke, W. S. Chandler and others own the land on one side and Messrs. Steckel, Buckman, et al on the other side and they are anxious to have the matter definitely settled.

Ship Supplies—The first supplies for Porter Brothers' camp on this end of the Ten Mile tunnel were shipped yesterday. They were sold by F. G. Horton, of the Allen & Lewis company, and the load was all that Ned Galloway could take on his barge. They were consigned to Scappell Brothers and Fleck, but Porter Brothers are paying the bill, Porter Brothers retaining charge of the work.

Boat for Porters—It is reported on the Bay that Porter Brothers may personally build a steam schooner for the Siuslaw run. A. F. Estabrook has been figuring on organizing a stock company of Siuslaw interests and building the boat but Porter Brothers, who are operating the mill at Florence, which will give the vessel most of its freight, are said to be desirous of building the boat. It is understood that Johnson Porter consulted with Kruse & Banks about the matter when here the other day.

Dayton Flood Report—Dorsey Kreitzer received a telegram today from his brother, Oscar, saying that he had just reached Dayton from New York after a hard trip. He said their parents were safe at the home of a sister. He said that the water was withing a few inches of the top of the Kreitzer home, which meant about 13 feet of water in the heart of Dayton.
